

Advocacy Southern Flounder Struggles


Southern flounder, paralichthys lethostigma (meaning parallel fish that forgot its spots), are one of the most popular gamefish native to the Eastern and Gulf Coasts of the United States.

s juveniles and adults, southern flounder can survive in bodies of water ranging from freshwater rivers and lakes to bays and offshore. That ability to tolerate varying salinities has allowed them to be widely distributed and highly abundant throughout our coastlines, particularly during seasonal spawning migrations. Their range begins in northern Mexico and extends through North Carolina, with a slight absence of presence around the tip of Florida. This wide distribution, coupled with their fighting ability and quality of flesh, make them one of the most prized catches among coastal anglers.


While they spend most of the year inshore feeding on invertebrates and smaller fish, adult southern flounder migrate to offshore waters each year during the late fall and early winter to depths of over 100 feet to spawn (some flounder have been found at depths greater than 350 feet), releasing on average 45,000 eggs per pound body weight.

After the eggs are fertilized in the water column, they float to the surface and, dependent on the water temperature, will hatch after an approximate 48-hour incubation period. A colder incubation temperature would equate to a longer incubation. After hatching, the larvae (measuring ~0.1 inches), will feed off their yolk sac for nearly a week, during which time the young fish

develop their eyes located on opposite sides of the head. The fish will begin feeding on prey items after the mouth parts and digestive tract have formed, and for the most part, they look like a "normal" fish larvae at this point of their life

Over the next approximately 30-40 days (again, dependent on water temperature), something truly remarkable happens. Losing their aura of ordinary larval fish, southern flounder will undergo a metamorphic process in which the skull bones bend and shift positions as the right eye migrates to the left side of the head. During this process the fish will swim at a slight angle, and pigmentation on the left side (top side) of their body begins to develop.

Once the right eye is in its final resting position, the fish settles onto the right side of its body and becomes a true flatfish for the remainder of its life (interestingly, a small percentage of southern flounder larvae undergo left eye migration, which makes one wonder if eye dominance plays a role in metamorphosis). It is just after metamorphosis when the flounder can tolerate variable water


conditions, allowing them to thrive in bays and estuaries as they migrate from offshore.

Imagine the energy demand required and resultant stress for an eyeball to move across a head, shifting skull bones in the process. Everything has to be in sync to pull off that feat. Unfortunately for flounder there are factors outside of their control that highly influence successful metamorphosis.


One of the most important abiotic factors that drives flounder development in offshore waters is temperature. In the Gulf of Mexico, young southern flounder larvae thrive at 62-65°F and can tolerate temperatures ranging from 59-73°F. After the flounder complete metamorphosis, that tolerance increases dramatically, but during the first few weeks of a flounder's life it is absolutely critical that water temperatures remain stable in the upper 60s. Winter water temperatures above that narrow tolerance have devastating effects on southern flounder larvae survivability, and subsequently recruitment into the bays the following spring.


Data shows that flounder stocks are in trouble

Female southern flounder live approximately 7 years. It takes 2 years for most female southern flounder to reach maturity, and due to their relatively short life span, ≤ 5 generations (year classes) contribute to the spawning biomass at any given time. Historically, the stock has been able to recover from back to back warm winters but throw a third or fourth consecutive warm winter into the picture, you begin to have far-reaching implications on the fishery. The colder winter of 2017-2018 provided the stock with a little respite after hitting all-time lows in juvenile recruitment in early 2016 and 2017. Recruitment across a time-series can be viewed in Figure 1. Notice that recent upticks in recruitments were preceded by management changes (2009 and 2014), cold winters, or both.




Recruits from the 2018 year class have now entered into the legal slot fishery and anglers across the coast are reporting that flounder stocks have recovered. Reports of increased landings in 2019 are also supported by data collected from bay trawls and gill nets (Figures 2 and 3), and while no one can deny that flounder fishing has improved this year, remember that we are fishing primarily off a single year class.





The flounder fishery is primarily supported by age-1/age-2 fish, and current 14-inch minimum size restrictions ensure that harvested fish are at least age-1. Figure 4 clearly shows that we are witnessing a rapid and dramatic decline in these fish. Furthermore, the warm winter of 2018-2019 has resulted in the fourth lowest year class recorded since 1982, meaning that we have very few flounder available to enter the slot fishery next year.



Bottom line, the flounder fishery is in trouble. We have one successful year class supporting the bulk of the fishery and absorbing most of the harvest pressure.

Tough Decisions Ahead

Moving forward, fisheries managers are going to be faced with difficult decisions on how to properly manage a mixed commercial and recreational southern flounder fishery that continually struggles to maintain status quo. The Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) Commission has acted in the past to increase the relative abundance of southern flounder and it appears that they will need to do more in the future.

In early November, TPW Coastal Fisheries staff briefed the TPW Commission on the status of southern flounder and discussed potential future management options, including further reductions in bag limits, boat limits, extension of seasonal closures, increases in slot size and gear restrictions to increase flounder abundance. We can expect TPW staff to begin the scoping and public hearing process in early 2020 to discuss these options with anglers.

It is likely that we will never get back to the flounder abundance we observed in the 1980's, but we should do everything within our ability to prevent further declines. All options should be on the table and it is time to answer the tough questions many have had for decades. Why have a commercial fishery for a species at the lowest end of its geographical range? What are the effects of the gigging fishery? Why just a 14-inch minimum size limit and why not raise it to 17 inches to ensure female flounder have 2 years to contribute to spawning biomass? Should we have a spring closure to allow the females to migrate into the bays after they have spawned offshore?

These are just some of the questions that need to be asked in the coming months and as we have these conversations, we need to remember that the fate of this resource is at stake.

Imagine if the figures in this article were representing declines in red drum or spotted seatrout. What would be your reaction? What measures would you take to ensure that fishery was conserved for future generations?

Southern Flounder In Brief

CCA Texas has donated over \$1 million to support flounder research and stock enhancement:

- > \$740,000 to University of Texas Marine Science Institute for facilities and equipment to support larvae research.
- > \$14,000 to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for a skiff to aid in flounder broodstock collection.
- > \$40,000 to Sea Center Texas Hatchery in Lake Jackson for flounder larvae culture equipment.
- > \$325,000 to Sea center Texas Hatchery in Lake Jackson for a flounder larvae culture building.
- > Male flounder average 10-14 inches in length.
- > Female length is variable, but a 20-inch fish is approximately 5 years of age.
- > With a 17" minimum size limit, nearly 100% of flounder would have reached sexual maturity and have two years to contribute to spawning biomass. With the current 14" minimum size limit, only 50% of the fish reach sexual maturity.
- > Flounder like it cold. Warm winters spell trouble for successful flounder recruitment.
- > When southern flounders reach sexual maturity at 2 years of age, the males measure 10-14 inches and females measure 15 inches or greater.
- > Most male flounder remain offshore year-round after migrating out of the estuary.
- > Females spawn small batches of about 45,000 eggs per pound over several days.

Earlier this year North Carolina closed its recreational flounder fishery until summer of 2020 and its commercial flounder fishery until late 2019, after the peak season passes. The North Carolina Division of Marine Fisheries stated that their most recent coast-wide (North Carolina to the east coast of Florida) stock assessment for southern flounder determined the stock is overfished and overfishing is occurring. North Carolina will have a 7-week recreational season for southern flounder in 2020. Will we see such drastic measures taken in Texas?

Habitat Today for Fish Tomorrow_

2019 Summary and

CA Texas has had another record-breaking year on many levels. The efforts of CCA Texas's chapters, volunteers, supporters, and sponsors has resulted in another record net fundraising year. Banquet attendance has been up across the board and many events have been sold out. This great support would not be possible without you, the CCA Texas member.

Whether you are a volunteer, event attendee, sponsor, or simply a member, you are a part of the success that CCA Texas has enjoyed. A successful fundraising season allows CCA Texas to be successful on many levels, including the habitat restoration and creation arena. CCA Texas has funded in excess of \$1.8 million in habitat restoration and creation in the last two years, and this success would not be possible without you!

2019 proved to be another great year in continuing to build and reinforce partnerships in the efforts to restore and create habitat along the Texas Gulf coast. In 2019, Habitat Today for Fish Tomorrow (HTFT) and Building Conservation Trust (BCT), CCA National's habitat program, funded \$900,000 for (8) projects. These projects included nearshore reefing, marsh restoration, and habitat research.

\$50,000 Dollar Bay Shoreline Protection and Marsh Restoration

This project is with long standing CCA Texas partner Galveston Bay Foundation (GBF). This project will use shoreline protection measures that will protect up to 1,500 feet of shoreline and restore 72 acres of intertidal wetland habitat within Dollar Bay, located within the Galveston Bay system.

Currently, GBF has contracted with an engineering firm to oversee the construction of the project. A contract is expected to be awarded for construction in the 1st quarter of 2020 with construction to begin immediately after.

\$50,000 - Galveston Bay Foundation Kemah Headquarters **Habitat Protection and Restoration**

The new Galveston Bay Foundation Headquarters in Kemah will not only provide a home of the GBF staff, but the property boundary shoreline will provide an excellent opportunity for local community schools, and citizens to see firsthand a healthy shoreline eco-system.

The long-term goal is to complete several demonstration habitat restoration projects on the property in addition to the living shorelines. This is to include oyster reefs, freshwater wetlands and prairie restoration. CCA Texas and BCT are committed to habitat restoration and providing educational experiences for the next generation of conservationists. GBF is currently reviewing design parameters for the project and making changes to bring the project within current funding levels. Once the reviews are completed, bids will be solicited, and the project will move to the next step.

\$75,000 – Harte Research Institute Serpulid Reef Study

This funding has allowed the team of HRI to move forward in the second stage of studying the serpulid reef communities within Baffin Bay. This phase of the study is evaluating the efficacy of using alternative substrates for restoration of Serpulid reef habitats in Baffin Bay.

Various potential substrates will be evaluated in the near future to see which ones best fulfill similar ecosystem functions to natural Serpulid worm reefs and will provide conservation benefits to remaining reefs.

\$100,000 - Sabine Lake Oyster Restoration with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

CCA Texas has now funded a total of \$205,000 to the restoration efforts in Sabine Lake. These funds are being paired with \$500,000 in Harvey Relief funds secured by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). TPWD is leading this project and is currently preparing specifications and designs. Once this stage is completed, TPWD will work with existing contractors and is targeting spring 2020 for cultch deployment.

\$100,000 - Sabine HI20 Nearshore Reef

CCA Texas and BCT have pledged \$100,000 in additional matching funds for reefing efforts in Sabine HI20 Reef site. These funds will be joined with funds from Cheniere Energy, Sempra LNG and TPWD to continue the next phases of reefing deployments into the Sabine HI20 Nearshore site.

\$125,000 - Aransas National Wildlife Refuge Shoreline Protection and Marsh Restoration (Dagger Point and Matagorda Island) with Coastal Bend Bays and Estuaries Program

The Coastal Bend Bays & Estuaries Program (CBBEP) will be partnering with the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to address damages suffered at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge from Hurricane Harvey.

Specifically, CBBEP will be working with USFWS to install a shoreline protection structure in San Antonio Bay that protects the habitats on the Blackjack Unit from erosion and storm events and, over time, restores upland and aquatic habitats that have been lost

due to erosion. CBBEP will also work with USFWS to repair damaged water control infrastructure on Matagorda \$1.8 million in habitat restoration and Island and restore water flow and circulation to important habitats, improving their quality for fisheries and other wildlife. The project is currently in the planning and design stages, and construction is expected to begin in 2021.

\$150,000 - Rio Grande Valley Nearshore Reef and Friends of RGV Reef

With this funding, CCA Texas and BCT have now funded \$661,000 to the Friends of RGV Reef. This project is providing a one of a kind complex reefing system that supports the entire life cycle of marine species in the area. This funding will help the next phase of deployment which is expected to begin in early January 2020 and will deploy 10,000 tons of materials. This will start the 400-acre CCA Nursery reef and will be made with 54 low relief reef patches of 25 tons of concrete rail ties, 25 tons of broken concrete, and 6 pallets (420 blocks) of cinder blocks. In addition, 16 patch reefs of 250 tons of concrete rail ties will line the reef in the north to keep shrimp trawls out of the nursery reef. 1,500 tons will also be added to the CCA Corner of the reef. CCA Texas and BCT are proud to continue supporting Friends of RGV Reef and congratulate them on the Conservation Wrangler award from Texan by Nature.

\$250,000 - Dagger Island Shoreline Protection and Marsh Restoration with Ducks Unlimited

The Dagger and Ransom Island Shoreline Protection Project is a wide-ranging project with the ultimate goal to eliminate or drastically reduce the rate of shoreline erosion and island migration. Three different types of shoreline protection (shoreline revetment, beneficial use, and offshore breakwaters) will be used at three priority areas.

Once completed, the project will protect more than 5,000 acres of marsh and wetlands and create more than 40 acres. Mobilization for the project construction began the first week of November and construction is expected to begin by the end of November.



All I want for Christmas...

That could mean so many things here on the Coast! Cold weather and hungry fish are at the top of my list. For starters, there's not as much boat traffic and second, no need to leave before sunrise as in summer months.

Focus on the upper part of our bay system; birds, slicks, clam and shell reefs, driftfishing from the boat and also wading mud bottom, drains or sloughs near shell with deep water near by.

My go to gear: when drifting from the boat, my personal choices are Waterloo Rods with 12 lb. mono on 1/8-1/4 ounce jigheads. Swim baits or finesse lures, Down South lures. Wading, I fish with 30 lb. braid with Custom Corkys Gringo/Pistachio or Lele's and a finesse bait like the DSL.

Our bay system is vast, so depending on the tide and wind and water temps, we may be in East Galveston bay or Trinity bay. Both bays are known for great numbers of trout/redfish.

As we get into the new year we will primarily be in waders, throwing suspending baits.

Be patient, quiet, and try not to work the bait too fast. Look at your surroundings, listen for bait jumping and be thorough.

But if the big bite doesn't happen, enjoy the magnificence of the outdoors, and remember you have to put in the time for the fish of a lifetime! Please be courteous to your fellow anglers, take a kid fishing, and when you hit your limit, leave 'em biting.

Middle Coast

Relax into a state of bliss

This is the time of year I look forward to because December and January are magical months to be out on the bay enjoying the bounty of our natural resources.

Whether you are wade fishing with artificial lures or fishing out of the boat with bait, this is the time when fish are colder so adjust your presentations to a slower pace. Lower water levels help to gather the fish in some areas.

There will be less fishing pressure as well, which creates more me-time on the water. These are times when the wader will relax into a state of bliss enjoying the sounds and sights of a pristine flat or an uninhabited shoreline. The middle coast fish are hearty and acclimate quickly to the dips in salt water chill. They are fit for the duration and will pound your presentation. The wader will thrive in these months chunking soft plastics and slow-sinking baits. Never leave port without top water plugs to tempt that fish of a lifetime.

Be prepared: clothing, equipment, lure selection, boat preparedness, weather checkups, safety gear, boat food. This could be the best outing of your life in the middle coast.

Gulp in 3 to 4 inch works well, but pack a few top water lures in light colors. When the water temperature drops, slow is the key.

the afternoon.

Remember that from December 1-14th the daily bag limit for flounder is two. Fish deep passes and guts when the tide is moving for your chance to tie into a supper flatfish.

This is a great time of the year to be on the water! It's nice and quiet because hunting season is in full swing. No need to get out of bed early—let the water warm up a tad and the sun get higher in the sky.

Let's make sure the LLM stays healthy by practicing catch and release. Be respectful of others on the water and our beloved ecosystem. So grab a jacket and get out there and fish! —Capt. 

Truly Crab-Stuffed Flounder

Try this technique for a real, stuffed-sock flounder that is easy to debone, without quartering it open, or making filets. Vary the mix, to suit your taste—Dr. Mike Sarosdy

Start with a larger flounder, 19-20" or so. Separate the meat from the skeleton front and back to the edges with a filet knife, using scissors to cut the rib to-finbones on the edges, about 2/3 of the way to the tail. Turn it inside-out like your sock, and pull the rest of the skeleton out, cutting the last fin-bones loose. A great YouTube video is "Deboning a Flounder for Stuffed Flounder using the Pocket Method."

Crab Stuffing:

2 Tablespoons butter or Ghee / 6 green onions, sliced and chopped / 2-3 teaspoons of minced garlic 1 large colored pepper, red or yellow, chopped / 1 egg, free-ranging / ½ teaspoon garlic powder 2 Tablespoons Dijon mustard, or spicy brown / 4 Tablespoons of heavy cream / 2 Tablespoons of light mayonnaise. 2 Tablespoons of fresh lemon juice / 12 Saltine crackers, rolled to bits / 1 pound of crab claw meat / Salt and Pepper to taste. Preheat oven to 350.



Combine egg in a glass bowl with cayenne, cream, mustard, garlic powder, mayonnaise, and lemon juice. Add crushed crackers and crabmeat, and S + P, if you like. Melt butter over medium heat, and sauté the onion, garlic, and peppers. Add the crabmeat, crackers and mix, and saute until crabmeat is warm. Stuff the warm mix into the flounder. Sprinkle with smoked paprika. Bake for 25-30 minutes, until fish flakes with a fork. Serve with a good Chardonnay or Pinot Grigio.

30th Annual CCA **State of Texas** Anglers' Rodeo

hat a wild ride of a year it has been for the 30th Annual CCA Texas STAR tournament! Between a major barge spill, high winds, and other curveballs throughout the tournament, anglers searching for a winning fish were kept on their toes. At the end of it all though, the milestone year of the tournament was a huge success. Not only was the record for most entrants broken, but the number of new anglers and youth anglers has never been higher! Getting more anglers involved in conserving our marine resources and bringing up the next generation of conservationists is what STAR is all about.


