## Texas Game Warden Internship Program

Texas Game Wardens For more than 125 years, Texas Game Wardens have watched over the lands, waters, wildlife, and people of Texas. Every year Texas Game Wardens patrol over 10 million miles by vehicle and 130,000 hours by boat, facing challenges as unique as the 254 counties they serve. With 550+ commissioned peace officers throughout the state, game wardens tirelessly lead the way in critical search and rescue operations; render aid during times of natural disaster like hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, and wildfires; and provide conservation enforcement and education for fishing, hunting, and boating.

Game wardens receive intensive training in a broad spectrum of topics such as conservation, criminal justice, water safety, penal code, and environmental laws. They are widely recognized as the best-trained corps of conservation officers in the nation and provide an invaluable service to the people of Texas.

#### Law Enforcement Interns

The goal of the Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) internship program is to increase opportunities for qualified students to gain invaluable insight and experience in the field of natural resource conservation. To accomplish this goal, the internship program provides talented Texas college students with paid internships at TPWD through



funding secured by Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation (TPWF). These internships allow students to put their classroom

knowledge to work, study more about the practical applications of the work in their field, and prepare for careers in their chosen fields.

At the beginning of the internship experience, each law enforcement intern attends an orientation at the 200-acre, state-of-the-art Game Warden Training Center and trains with Texas Game Wardens before entering the field. Once in the field, each game warden intern is assigned to observe and assist licensed game wardens in their regular duties, ranging from law enforcement to public safety and education. They work 20 hours per week for 10 weeks during the summer, with an allowance for additional hours needed to work emergency situations or prolonged investigations.

Interns gain experience in a wide variety of unscripted, realtime circumstances including boating and safety enforcement, search and rescue, fishing rules and regulations, and common techniques employed by poachers. In addition, they increase their knowledge of wildlife biology. In 2022, TPWD was able to hire a total of 16 law enforcement interns. including 6 coastal interns stationed all along our coastal communities, thanks to continued funding from the Coastal Conservation Association.



Since the program began, **interns** have regularly gone on to become Texas Game Wardens. According to Program Coordinator Lt. Rachel Kellner, on average, six to eight cadets in every class of the Texas Game Warden Academy are former interns. Lt. Kellner sees this program as TPWD's single best recruitment tool in the Law Enforcement Division. Being a former intern herself, she has witnessed firsthand the indelible effect the program has on potential cadets. The program continues to harvest Texas' brightest and most impassioned recruits.

The position of game warden cadet is highly coveted, and individuals are chosen from a pool of thousands of applicants. In addition to federal and state hiring requirements, Texas Game The position of game warden cadet is highly coveted, and individuals are chosen from a pool of thousands of applicants.

Warden applicants must pass six additional steps in their application process, including Physical Readiness Testing, law enforcement background investigation, psychological evaluation, medical evaluation, TPWD Law Enforcement Senior Staff review, and TPWD Law Enforcement Executive Staff and Human Resources Director review.

TPWD plans to hire 14 law enforcement interns for 2023, including 6 CCA interns who



will be strategically stationed throughout coastal areas of Texas to champion Coastal Conservation Association's steadfast focus on marine conservation and education.

TPWD and TPWF are grateful for the unwavering support of CCA members over the past seven years, which has enabled life-changing experiences for youth interested in careers dedicated to conserving Texas' natural resources. CCA's continued support will help to foster a growing cadre of qualified individuals passionate about conserving the wild things and wild places of Texas.

## Try, Try Again

#### If at first you don't succeed, try, try again.

his age-old advice once again rings true as critical sciencebased conservation decisions have been hijacked by political maneuvers, orchestrated by those that stand to personally benefit from the continued and systematic destruction of public trust resources.

Case in point – our Texas public oyster reefs.

You may recall that in March 2022, Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission (TPWC) considered the closure of Carlos, Mesquite and Ayres Bays, otherwise known as the Mesquite Bay Complex, to oyster harvest. The closure would protect ecologically sensitive and unique oyster habitat from the negative biological impacts of increased harvest pressure through the act of dredging reefs. To put it simply, per Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD), the ecological importance and sensitivity of these oyster reefs coupled with the historically high harvest pressure and highly variable oyster relative abundance makes this minor bay complex a candidate for permanent closure from harvest.

During the 2021-2022 public oyster fishing season, **this area provided** 



**30.4% of the coast-wide landings.** Consider that for a moment. An area that represents approximately 2.8% of the oyster habitat in Texas provided over 30% of the landings, before the area was closed after only 2 months of

However, despite this data, a lastminute letter was submitted on the eve of the March 24<sup>th</sup> meeting, requesting that TPWC delay any decision on a closure until TPWD "study the benefits oyster harvesting has on cultivating healthy reefs, conduct an in-depth economic impact study, and develop a concrete plan to regularly sample any closed areas to ensure that closure works as a tool to significantly replenish the oyster population." Yes, you read that correctly – study the benefits that dredging has on cultivating healthy reefs.

At that March meeting, public support to permanently close the Mesquite Bay Complex to oyster harvesting was overwhelming with 79% of comments favoring the closure. Additionally, 16 nongovernment organizations submitted individual letters backing the justification for the proposal and offered oyster fishery management recommendations for TPWC to consider moving forward. Furthermore, during public testimony, commissioners directly asked Dr. Jennifer Pollack, Endowed Chair for Coastal Conservation & Restoration at Harte Research Institute for Gulf of Mexico Studies at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, if dredging the reefs is beneficial and helpful for the reefs. She replied, "I, to be honest, was very surprised to hear this comment coming up so often because it

was something that I heard in the previous public hearings that I attended...and as a result I scoured the literature...**there is no data out there to indicate that dredging a reef is beneficial for a reef**."

However, after listening to nearly 4 hours of public testimony and receiving the last-minute letter, TPWC was unable to land on a decision (You can listen to that entire meeting and public comment by clicking here and forwarding the audio to the 18:41 mark. Dr. Pollack's concluding comments can be found starting at 3:56:00). As you may recall, they opted to form a task force of stakeholders to develop metrics that would define success of a possible closure and evaluate the oyster fishery from a holistic standpoint, ultimately providing suggestions to increase sustainability and oyster fishing opportunities.

As the workgroup continues to meet and have valuable discussions, TPWD has determined that the proposal to prohibit oyster harvest in the Mesquite Bay Complex should be brought forward for reconsideration. You can read and comment on the proposal by <u>clicking here</u>

So now the opportunity to "try, try again" is before us. On November 3, 2022, TPWC will once again consider the proposal to prohibit the harvest of oysters in Carlos Bay, Mesquite Bay, and Ayres Bay. To consolidate our efforts, we have partnered with FlatsWorthy to bring public awareness to this issue through the usage of Rockport-area billboards, informational videos and mailers. ## Your comments are needed

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is accepting public comments for a proposal to close Mesquite, Carlos, and Ayres bays (Mesquite Bay Complex) to oyster harvest. The Mesquite Bay Complex contains ecologically important and sensitive oyster reefs that provide ecosystem services such as nursery habitat for fish and shoreline protection.

Oyster harvest pressure in this minor bay complex has increased steadily over the past decade, while monitoring data from the TPWD has shown highly variable trends and an overall lower relative abundance of oysters compared to neighboring bays. The ecological importance and sensitivity of these oyster reefs coupled with the historically high harvest pressure makes this minor bay complex a candidate for permanent closure from harvest.

"While I was standing below one of the rod holders on the side mount, something hit the line, and the reel started screaming. I grabbed it and watched the line continue to run out for what felt like another 30 seconds while we stopped the boat. I worked the rod to keep constant pressure, and it was a battle where if he wasn't taking line, I was bringing the line back in. As the King got closer, he shifted from one side of the boat to the other several times, and I had no choice but to follow him around. It wasn't until about 25 minutes after the initial hit that I finally saw a body, and I could then understand how this was taking so long. I knew this would likely be the biggest fish I had ever reeled in. He made his swimming seem effortless while I struggled to gain any distance. He got within 10' of the boat a couple of times before returning to tease me. After a good 30 minutes of fighting, I finally got him close enough for somebody to gaff him and got it in the boat. Then, my adrenaline started wearing off, and I realized how tired my hands and body were. This is the biggest, most exciting, and most exhausting catch I've ever had in my life."

#### **Gulf Identification Guide**



#### Upper Coast Capt. Josh MacNaughton

Bay boat options Hello fall! Water temps in the 60's mean trout can't resist a Corky slowly sinking by. Christmas Bay and Chocolate Bayou: the marsh and bay systems just off these bodies of water is likely where the fish will be taking refuge into the season's transition. Back lakes and bayous like Halls and Greens should be thick with healthy redfish. Up the coast, marshes like Confederate Reef should be holding larger trout in nice quantities. Following the first good front and north wind push, flounder and reds will be easy targets at any marsh drain. Apply this theory to all of our large marsh systems and back lake estuaries. Throwing light tackle, a great set up would be plum, pink or pearl Corky Fat Boysabsolute trout candy at Confederate!

Tabbs and Trinity Bay up to Sabine will see activity continue to heat up as the temps cool down. This is a prime time for marsh fishing, so don't be afraid to venture back deep in the marshes if your boat will float. If there is water with bait, there is fish, so up your drift and fish! Live bait, preferably shrimp, on a popping cork makes for a relaxing day on the water if you want to take a break from slinging artificial. The birds will continue to be a valuable resource in locating schools of trout and redfish as well. If you are still having issues locating fish, the old faithful top water is a great search bait. She dog in pink or clown spook Jr. are the most valuable tools in my box. No matter what you choose, just get out and get on the water. - Capt. Josh MacNaughton J and J Fishing / www.championsoutdoors.com

#### Kayakers and shallow water fishers

Marsh fishing is heating up for the fall transition. The flounder run will pick up after the first good cold front. Remember the current size and limit restrictions on flounder: TPW regulations are 5 flounder per day, minimum size 15 inches. *November 1st through December 14, the season is closed.* 

Texas Bayou should be producing healthy flounder, redfish and trout with both the channels and marsh systems providing quick limits. For live bait choice, mud minnows or shrimp will do you well. Artificial baits: go with heavier jigs in the channel and lighter jigheads as you move into the shallow marsh systems. A 1/8 ounce, with a morning glory or Texas roach-colored swim bait works well with the muddier water we encounter. Keep it heavy in the channels and deeper water. 1/4 oz jig head is perfect for getting the bait down to the fish for a quicker presentation.

Now, high tides push reds into the marsh grass, shrimp on the popping cork will bring the fish out of the grass lines for a sure bite when the artificial action slows down.

### Middle Coast

Capt. Chuck Naiser Smaller crowds, cooler weather

**Good news first:** We have lived through a drought. Now the autumnal equinox brings many changes that create excellent fishing opportunities. We'll have some of the more interesting fishing of the year. October and November are both blessed with currents. Another happy fact is that there are typically smaller crowds in the fall because of hunting season and high school activities with kids.

A word to the wise: with the onset of hunting season there will be guns on the water and if you get in a conflict remember the old rule, guns beat rods. I've got a motto that I try to live by; let's live to do this again because it might be fun.

A word on stewardship: We were blessed with a great resource and it didn't happen by accident. God placed it here and man has done his best to tear it up so if we want this to survive, we need to be aware of the little things that we do that are big things to the fishery.

Sad news: For anyone who has followed the history and evolution of our fishery, one of the major architects of House Bill 1000 left us recently. Jim Adkins was a stalwart in the battle for the passage of the legislation that created the fishery that we have today. He was extremely active in the Corpus Christi area, serving as president of the Corpus Christi chapter of GCCA. His work then is an important element of the fishery we have now.

Finally, the oyster issue is gonna come back up and will be cited on November 3. Please stay tuned as it's now or never for this important issue to be adopted. If we don't succeed this time, it never will get done. instructions for becoming involved will be forthcoming in CURRENTS and TIDE so stay tuned. **-Captain Chuck Naiser** *Chuck Naiser was one of the early GCCA founders. #### Lower Coast Capt. David Rowsey Go at the crack of dawn

In our low-current, warm waters we'll be looking forward to the first cold fronts. Water temps will finally stabilize from warm 70's into cool 60's. As big migrations of baitfish gather and head for Gulf passes, there'll be plenty of quality gamefish keeping company. That's the cue to pinpoint concentrations of prime gamefish, especially groups of big redfish that like to go shallow for breakfast and lunch. As usual, quality specks will be deeper and require more patience as well as deeper presentations of lures.

Wind may be a problem on most of the Texas coast, but here it's your friend because so much of our currents are wind-driven. As you wadefish, good currents are one key to bumping into the fish concentrations you're after. If wadefishing is your passion as it is mine, the many miles of lower coast shorelines are the place to be-at the crack of dawn. I like to start casting as the sun rises. Topwaters can be effective, but if there are no blowups right away, my go-to fish locators are the Bass Assassins. Mid-water plugs are primary weapons. I especially like the Corkys for big trout that tend to linger deeper, waiting for a slow-moving meal.

Of course, you will be concerned about the health of the resource. Those magnificent trout and big redfish need to have a chance to provide next generation fish for our next generations of fishers.

Caldwell said, "Others may deserve this honor more than me, but I'm going to accept it."
