

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Motions for New Spotted Seatrout Regulations

s you may recall, Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) conducted public scoping meetings in October to gather input from stakeholders and constituents concerning spotted seatrout management options. The meetings were held in Port Arthur, Texas City, Port Lavaca, Rockport, Corpus Christi & Port Isabel.




Figure 1: Texas Parks and Wildlife Scoping and Survey Results on Trout Fishery.

A total of 275 comments were received at these meetings and via email. Additionally, on behalf of TPWD, Texas A&M University conducted a ran-

domized email survey with over 10,000 saltwater anglers and 1,000 fishing guides, receiving 1,584 responses (see Figure 1 below).

After the scoping meetings, TPWD staff presented fisheries data and public responses to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission (TPWC) at their November 2023 meeting. Subsequently, the TPWC discussed options for the fishery moving forward.

Observing the linked video, you'll notice a significant amount of concern expressed regarding the effects of the 2021 freeze, elevated pressure on the resource, and the overall trajectory of the fishery.

Most notably, for the past 3 years, spring gill net catch rates in the Matagorda and San Antonio Bay Systems have experienced ≥30% declines from the previous 10-year mean. After much discussion, the TPWC directed staff to publish a proposal to modify the coast-wide bag and size

limit on speckled trout to a 3-fish bag limit with a 15-20-inch slot size and allowance of one fish over 25-inches to be part of the 3-fish bag. This proposed regulation change would provide the fishery with an estimated 26.7% increase in spawning stock biomass over the lifetime of a

trout (7-8yrs), with the goal of recovering the fishery from recent declines and enhancing the fishery's readiness to face specific challenges.

You can expect TPWD to hold public meetings along the coast to gather comments on this proposal, likely in the second week of January. Additionally, once the proposal is published, TPWD will accept comments online through their public comment portal and via email. CCA Texas will communicate the details of these meetings, opportunities for public input, and our position on this proposal after it is published. If you care to speak directly

to the TPWC regarding this proposal, you may do so on January 25, 2024, in Austin at their scheduled meeting.

As we approach this opportunity to shape the future of the speckled trout fishery, it is important to keep a few things in mind.

- From 2013 to 2023, All-water Guide License sales have increased by 62%, from 1,060 to 1,720.
- From 2013 to 2023, Saltwater License sales have increased from 1.2M to 1.4M.
- The Texas population has increased by nearly 4M people since 2013 and is expected to reach 55M people by 2025.
- 2023 Spring Gill Net data shows that nearly every bay system is seeing recent declines in catch rates, with Matagorda and San Antonio Bays at an alarming 32% and 34% decrease from the previous 10-year average.

It is imperative that the angling public participate in this upcoming opportunity to have their voices heard, and as you do so ask yourself this question: Do you want the speckled trout fishery managed with a vision for the future or would you prefer the tides of circumstance to carry this fishery into uncharted waters?




Figure 3: Recent Spotted Seatrout Landings Data




Figure 4: Coastwide Spring Gillnet Average 1982-2023



TPW Commission Chairman Jeff Hildebrand encourages TPW staff to move expeditiously on the proposal.


SPECIES PROFILES





SPOTTED SEATROUT

Spotted seatrout (Cynoscion nebulosus), known as speckled trout, is a popular game fish targeted by anglers along the Texas coast. This species is a member of the drum family (Sciaenidae) and is closely related to red drum, black drum, sand seatrout, and Atlantic croaker. Distinguishing characteristics include a dark gray or green back and silvery-white below, with distinct black spots on its back, fins, and tail. The inside of their mouth is yellow; typically, they have one or two prominent canine teeth at the tip of their upper jaw.





Habitat: Spotted seatrout reside in shallow bays and estuaries near marsh edge, seagrass beds, oyster reefs. or rock formations that attract prey items.



Salinity: Spotted seatrout are euryhaline, meaning they can tolerate a wide range of salinity, and have been found in salinities ranging from 0.2 ppt - 75 ppt.



Temperature: Spotted seatrout can live in a broad range of temperatures. They can tolerate water temperatures from 39 - 91° F if they are acclimated gradually to the extreme of these ranges. Along the

Texas Gulf Coast, sudden and extreme temperature decreases accompanying cold fronts often result in mass mortalities of spotted seatrout. The rate of temperature change and acclimation period may be more important than how low the temperature drops. Thermal stress mortality occurs when they are exposed to water temperatures lower than 45° F for over 24 hours. However, fish exposed to temperatures between 45-50° F for short periods can recover and survive.



Growth: Spotted seatrout growth rates are different for males and females. Females grow faster and larger versus males in the same age class. Studies also reveal there is a high degree of variability that exists in spotted

seatrout growth rates in bays along the Texas Coast. They can live to be 9 to 10 years of age and can reach lengths of more than 30 inches. Although rare, the oldest documented spotted seatrout in Texas was a 12-year-old, 25 inch male.

Reproduction: Spotted seatrout reach sexual maturity as early as age one. Spawning takes place from April through September when water temperatures range

from 70°- 90° F. Females can spawn multiple batches per season (9 batches per season assumed in the table below), and the number of eggs produced is dependent upon their size. Small fish are capable of releasing over 100,000 eggs, and larger females can release over 1 million eggs, per spawning event. Two-, three-, and four-year-old fish make up the bulk of the spawning population. When spawning commences, males will surround females, bumping or nudging the stomachs of females to induce them to release eggs. Once eggs are released, males will release their milt (sperm) which fertilizes the eggs. Fertilized eggs hatch in 20 to 24 hours. Research indicates that spotted seatrout spawn between dusk and dawn and broadcast spawn within coastal bays, estuaries, and lagoons. Peak spawning takes place around new and full moon periods when large tidal swings carry their buoyant eggs and larvae into shallow seagrass beds, which provide critical nursery habitat offering cover from predators and abundant food resources.

CCA Texas Commitments to Conservation Efforts Top \$5.942 Million in 2023

The grassroots efforts of local CCA Texas chapters have set the organization up for a monumental year in conservation dollars awarded for projects up and down the Texas coast. The success of CCA Texas continues to be the efforts of the 60 local chapters across the state, and the unwavering support of the membership, donors, and supporters. Local community support and a desire to ensure Texas's coastal resources are conserved have been

the focus of the organization since the first day fourteen concerned recreational anglers first sat down to discuss the common concerns. What started as fourteen has grown to over 75,000+ CCA Texas members from all walks of life and communities across the state. At the time of this article, CCA Texas State and Executive Boards have approved \$5,942,466 for conservation efforts in 2023.

As funds are raised, new studies will launch, including acoustic and satellite tracking of fishes during the juvenile phase, captive holding and spawning of dolphinfish and cobia in the Texas A&M University at Galveston Sea Life Center, and a Gulf-wide assessment of trophic transfer of contaminants, including microplastics, to coastal and offshore fishes.

\$82,000 – TPWD Game Warden's Floating Cabin in Baffin Bay

CCA Texas has a long history of supporting TPWD Game

Wardens up and down the Texas coast. This support often comes in the form of equipment, intern salaries, and in this particular grant, a floating cabin that will give the wardens adequate access to the waters of the Upper Laguna Madre, Baffin and the northern end of the Land Cut areas. Both floating cabins in the Laguna Madre system suffered significant and or total losses after Hurricane Hanna in 2020. Since

then, the wardens have felt the loss of these vital assets in reduced efficiency of boat fuel, maintenance, and patrol hours. When overall fishing and water safety cases were compared from the two years prior and two years post loss of the floating cabin in the Baffin area, wardens observed a 28% drop in efficiency. When only speckled trout violations were compared in the same period, wardens incurred a 62% decline in citations written. While other variables play a role in these numbers, wardens can attest that they would have been largely mitigated by the presence of a floating cabin that can allow them to stay on station longer.

Local community support and a desire to ensure Texas's coastal resources are conserved, have been the focus of the organization since the first day fourteen concerned recreational anglers first sat down to discuss the common concerns.

\$125,000 – Texas A&M University at Galveston Gulf Research Institute for Highly Migratory Species

Funding for the Institute will support research initiatives to aid in the conservation of highly migratory species in Texas and throughout their range in the Gulf of Mexico and Atlantic Ocean. This gift will help scientists unravel the unique life histories of these ecologically and economically valuable top predators. Additionally, the funding will support the preparation and training of the next generation of fisheries scientists.





As an example of great CCA Investments, here's a favorite recent CCA investment: The TPWD floating cabin in Baffin Bay is currently under construction, and nearing completion. This cabin replaces one of the floating cabins destroyed by Hurricane Hanna in 2020 and will restore TPWD Game Wardens presence in the area.

\$39,000 - CCA Texas Conservation Billboards

Hundreds of thousands of people travel the highways of Texas daily. Public outreach and education are one of the major tenants of CCA Texas, and the coastal highways provide a great outreach opportunity. CCA Texas has funded forty-eight billboards on an annual basis to educate the general population of Texas about the importance of coastal conservation and where you can find information about projects and advocacy efforts of CCA Texas.

\$225,000 – Harte Research Institute (HRI) Oyster Reef Monitoring Program

CCA Texas has long been a strong advocate for better management and conservation of oyster resources along the coast. CCA Texas played a very active role in the effort to see the Mesquite Bay complex closed permanently to all forms of oystering in November of 2022. As an advocate for this effort and with a desire to see sound management in the future, CCA Texas funded \$225,000 to HRI over a three-year period to monitor the changes in the reefs in this closed bay system so that a baseline can be established for these types and closures and the benefits they will bring. This project will include monitoring twice a year for a three-year period.

\$200,000 – Friends of RGV Reef Causeway Reef and MU775 Reefing Efforts

Friends of RGV Reef (FRGVR) has been a shining example of local grassroots efforts and partnerships for many years now. With its incredible efforts to construct a 1,600-acre reef off South Padre Island almost filled, FRGVR continues to work on reefing efforts in the area and to support those up the coast in the Corpus area. This request for funding will help reef materials on hand into the new Causeway Reef site off South Padre Island and in the MU775 site, located just off the Packery Channel in Corpus Christi. This reefing will take place in the first half of 2024 and CCA Texas is proud to continue supporting the efforts of great nearshore habitat along the Texas coast.

\$19,000 - TPWD Seagrass Billboards

CCA Texas partners with TPWD on outreach efforts often and the TPWD Seagrass Billboards have been long supported. These billboards point the general public to information that is important to the conservation of this important habitat.

\$7,860 – TPWD Game Warden Equipment TPWD Game Wardens are the front line of defense for our coastal resources. CCA Texas has a long history of supporting the wardens and helping fund the necessary day-to-day equipment that they need to execute their jobs.

\$10,000 – Coastal Brigade of Texas Brigades CCA Texas has been a supporter of Coastal Brigade since its inception in 2016. This 5-day program encompasses coastal habitat

management, fisheries management, coastal

ecology and saltwater fishing. The tried-and-true Brigades model of leadership development, education, and empowerment continues at Coastal Brigade and CCA Texas is proud to continue its support for the future generations that will support and conserve Texas's coastal resources.

\$80,000 - HRI Bringing Baffin Back Work Boat

CCA Texas proudly supports HRI's staff and the initiative, Bringing Baffin Back. In 2022, CCA Texas approved \$225,000 (\$75,000/year for three years) to primarily fund continuing water quality sampling and studies. In an effort to improve accessibility and safety, CCA Texas has funded the purchase of a new boat for the HRI staff to use as part of the Bringing Back Baffin initiative and other research projects that HRI is a part of.

\$110,500 - TPWD Coastal Fisheries Internships

CCA Texas continued its longstanding support of TPWD Coastal Fisheries interns by funding 17 interns for the 2024 year. These internships include eight fisheries management team positions, one each in Lower Laguna Madre, Corpus Christi Bay, Aransas Bay, San Antonio Bay, Matagorda Bay, Galveston Bay, and Sabine Lake ecosystem offices. Additionally, four ecosystem resources team positions; one each in Corpus Christi and Dickinson, and two to be determined. One genetic research team position is funded in Palacios and four hatchery technicians, two each at Sea Center Texas and CCA/CP Marine Development Center.

\$15,600 - TPWD Summer Game Warden Interns

TPWD Game Wardens are the front line to the protection of Texas's coastal resources. CCA Texas proudly continues its support of the TPWD Summer Game Warden interns and has funded \$15,600 which will be used to place six interns in the TPWD Game Wardens Summer Intern program.

\$28,506 – TPWD Game Warden Upper Coast Boat Motor and Night Vision

CCA Texas continues to support the efforts to conserve the oyster resources of Texas. Recent funding was approved that will fund \$21,000 to the upper Texas coast Game Wardens to purchase a new 250 HP Suzuki outboard motor and \$7,506 for the purchase of night vision goggles and the helmets and mounts for them. This equipment is critical in their continuous enforcement efforts especially those under the cover of dark when some of the most egregious violations take place.

\$5,000,000 – Oyster Reef Restoration Along the Texas

Coast / Being at the forefront of oyster reef conservation and management, CCA Texas has also stepped up to the forefront of private funding. CCA Texas's Executive Board approved \$5,000,000 that is earmarked for oyster restoration efforts in areas closed to oystering along the Texas coast. These funds will be used to help restore critical reefs lost over time due to natural and man-made forces. CCA Texas looks forward to being a leader in these efforts and this grant cements our commitment to the oyster resources of Texas. CCA Texas looks forward to a successful 2024 and shares in the excitement of the local chapters as they all collectively make a difference in the conservation of Texas's coastal resources.

A FISHING STORY

He woke up before the alarm went off, opened the motel door and looked up. A lot of stars visible. Not much wind either. Port O'Connor is a small town, and there was already some traffic, folks headed for jobs elsewhere. He got dressed and went across to Josey's, a small Mexican food shop. It opened early, catering to a group of old men who met there every morning to drink coffee and talk about the weather and whatever else was on their minds. He had a couple of egg tacos. He felt good.

There were a few dark cumulus clouds over the Gulf, but in the Texas summer, there often were. He picked up his boat, launched and headed out to a pond he had found two weeks ago that had held some redfish. Maybe they were still there, maybe not. You never knew, but he was going to give it a try.

He was a little worried about finding the slough that led to that pond. There were a lot of sloughs opening up on that shoreline. He cruised slowly along the grassy edge. Besides the putting engine, the only sound was the licking of the ripples on his bow. He found the opening, or was pretty sure he had, cut off the engine and poled in. The slough splayed out, with tendrils heading every direction, most of them finishing in grassy dead ends or unpassable sand bars. But when he saw it, he remembered the cut. It was barely wide enough for his boat to pass. He poled through, and there it was—a small lake, surrounded by mangroves. He could smell the salt. The water was clear, and despite the low light, he saw them—three pods of tailing reds. Their tails were flipping, glinting pink and orange. From the size of their tails, they looked like good fish. There were shrimp jumping all around them. He anchored as quietly as he could, and waded toward the closest pod. He hooked up on his first cast, and reversed his wade, hoping to pull the fish away from the other pods so they wouldn't bolt. That didn't work. It never did.

He released the fish, about 24 inches, and continued a slow wade. He was looking intensely into the water, not up at the sky, but he eventually noticed that some of those dark clouds seemed to be moving in from the Gulf. Distant booms of lightning began. After a while, he couldn't convince himself anymore that the storm wasn't coming at him.

As the storm moved in, it put the pods down. He waded to the muddy edge of the pond, and laid down his fly rod, worried that it would act as a lightning rod. He squatted on his heels, to leave as little contact with the wet ground as he could. It was a small system but it was moving toward him fast. The rain hit him, first with scattered big drops, then in a torrent. He got soaked in no time, but the rain was warm.

There was nowhere to run, nothing to shelter under and no choice but to

wait it out. He pulled his pack of Red Man out of his shirt pocket, and settled in for a wet chew.

Witnessing a storm like that from underneath was spectacular. It occurred to him that any sane person would be really scared. But strangely, he wasn't, and he wasn't going to leave those fish. Besides, there was nothing he could really do. He figured his boat was a more likely lightening target than he was, anyway. Furthermore, he believed that those tailing reds would just go to deeper water and would get back to their business the minute the squall passed over.

As the rain pelted him and the lightning cracked above him, he asked himself if there were any place, any place in the world, he would rather be right then. He was perfectly at peace.


Sure enough, as soon as it calmed, there they were. Except this time there were five pods. He felt blessed. He caught one each from three of the pods and released them too. By then, there was enough light that he could see into the water. The storm was behind him and the sun had gotten higher in the sky. He could see them swimming now and began to cast to singles busted out of the pods. He landed two more. He strung those. Finally, they got spooky and it was over.

It was an experience that he thought, rightly, he would remember as an old man.

He waded back to his boat. He pulled up the anchor, and slowly putted out of the slough. He cruised back to the launch, cranked his boat onto his trailer, drove to his boat locker and cleaned his fish. It was still pretty early, but he was finished for the day.

He was a happy man. He would be back.

Port O'Connor resident Dexter Peacock recognized the plight of the redfish early on and was a primary worker in the struggle to pass House Bill 1000, the "Redfish Bill" in 1981. A Lifetime Member of CCA Texas, he served on the Excecutive Committee and was Chairman of the Legal Affairs Committee for 19 years.

Sadly, many institutions of higher learning no longer emphasize professions geared to life skills, so winners now have more choices choosing career paths. Even better, **ALL** STARkids and STARteens that make the final Leaderboard are receiving scholarships starting at \$2,500 up

to \$30,000. With a cost per "hour" of \$30 at Lone Star College, you can receive quite an education versus at \$3,000 per hour!

Thanks to YOU, loyal member, the mission of CCA Texas continues to blaze new territory in our quest to make Texas saltwater the envy of the nation. Because of our grassroots momentum, we will now begin to rebuild destroyed oyster reefs and make what was once dead live again with our recent commitment of \$5,000,000 into oyster restoration. CCA-built hatcheries are cranking pretty much at full production, raising baby fish to go back into the water. On the heels of creating more than 10 offshore reefs in recent years, and dedicated attention given to the trout fisheries since the freeze, Texas anglers can look forward to a bright future indeed. In the Spirit of the season, we are grateful to you and wish you and yours a most wonder-full Christmas.

We would like to extend a special thank you to Mr. Tim Chapman for his contribution to the CCA Texas STAR Tournament. On August 3rd, 2023, Tim caught the 7th CCA **Texas STAR Tournament** red-tagged redfish in the Lower Laguna Madre. We spoke with him before he even reached Port Mansfield with the tag, and he immediately offered to donate his boat to CCA Texas as an auction item. Tim went above and beyond by repowering





the boat with a 225hp Mercury motor and adding a T-top and other features courtesy of Chris's Marine. His generous support will help us continue our mission of marine conservation and habitat restoration. The funds raised from the auction will undoubtedly contribute significantly to the success of our conservation programs. Once again, thank you, Tim and Brown Water Marine!





Caught Redhanded! Reports from Texas Parks & Wildlife Game Wardens





On 10/30/23, a Galveston Game Warden inspected an individual leaving a fishing pier. It was discovered that the fisherman had seven untagged bull reds in his possession and no fishing license. Multiple citations were issued and civil restitution charged.

In October of 2023, Texas Game Warden Casey Willmon who is assigned to Calhoun County responded to a call of suspicious activity at a local fish cleaning table. As the warden arrived on location he witnessed multiple individuals cleaning undersized red snapper. Upon further investigation the suspects were found to have no fishing licenses, in possession of 31 undersized red snapper, over the limit of red snapper, and an undersized gag grouper.

Multiple class C misdemeanor cases were filed and are pending.

On 10/20/23, Jefferson County Wardens filed on individuals for untagged Red Drum.

Cold front alert!

As we move through December, expect the best trout fishing to be just off the banks. The early rising wadefisher will have the upper hand here for trout, because you can watch for bait movement as specks move away chasing after baitfish. Check a good chart and seek shallow areas with deeper guts and depressions nearby.

On East wind days, it's hard to catch fish unless you get out of the boat. You can locate a leeward shore, or fish the Intracoastal. West Bay can be good on wind days, but once again, the key is locating and fishing guts and depressions where the fish are sheltering. Redfish will be deeper. Look for and fish off-colored wa-

ter on purpose.

Cold fronts are coming along, but they can be your friend. I don't go during a front, but a couple of days before and especially after a big one, the fish seem to get excited and look for lures. Lures; my favorites of all time are the bone Super Spook and the good old Corky because I'm usually looking for trophy fish. Plastic tails can be good. Flapping Shad Gulp is good, but piggy perch eat the tails. Gulp caught fish on a recent trip while live shrimp were fishless. The Little John has almost no action but they catch fish. Reds are tough, but trout need careful release. Use hookouts or wet your hands. Turn the big ladies back. —Capt. Ralph Frazier 281-337-0321

Middle Coast

December on the big middle coast: If we haven't had any extreme cold spells, it's like fishing on a fall day. One of the best bets is the Colorado River. Drift with the current and make casts towards the shore. I prefer using a 3/8 ounce leadhead rigged with a bright colored paddle tail soft plastic like a Margarita Norton Sandshad Jr. Re-member that the colder the water tempera-tures, the deeper the fish will be.

An option in East Matagorda Bay is looking for streaks of off color water in the clear water and drifting those areas. With low tides, wadefishing the South shore of West Matagorda Bay can produce some really good redfish action. Concentrate on drains and guts. My go-to baits are 1/4 ounce weedless gold spoons or dark Norton Sandshads rigged on 1/16 oz. leadheads. Again, work all baits slower than you normally would.

January can be a great time to try to catch your "bucket list "trout. Wading East Matagorda Bay is the place to be out of the boat. Work Corkies or Soft Dines in areas where baitfish are nervous. Drifting areas of scattered shell can also be productive. I throw the same baits I use in the river. Wherever you're casting a lure, did I say that slowwww is the way to go? Tip: finding out your waders leak is not a good way to start a wade in the winter. Take care of your crew; it's your first job.

Be a Weatherman!

It's that time of the year again when we need to keep a close eye on the weather. Decem-ber and January can bring some cold and wet stuff our way for a few days then turn to beautiful fishing conditions. Be prepared for the good and bad!

Colder water temperatures and lower tides will push fish off the flats and into deeper channels and holes. Work the deep-er depressions slow with soft plastics and heavier jigs. I like a darker lure for this such as root beer with a chartreuse tail

Sight fishing with either a spinning rod or a fly rod can be special this time of the year also! This is a great time to have that second cup of coffee and wait for the sun to warm the flats. Work a lure slow and close to the fish when sight fishing on these flats. Work a top water slow through potholes in about three feet of water. Use a drift sock if you're fishing from a boat so you don't move over them too fast. Fly fishermen seem to have an advantage on good-weather days after a cold front pushes through. Work the flat slow by poling a skiff or wading. A good soft presentation with a crab fly should get a bite!

Remember to keep a close eye on the weather and pack accordingly. There are gonna be some epic days on the water com-ing soon. Happy Holidays! — Capt. Bryan

Shrimp & Pork Dumplings

INGREDIENTS

1/2 lb ground pork
1/2 lb minced fresh
raw shrimp
2 scallions diced
1 Tbsp minced fresh
ginger
1 Tbsp minced garlic
4 green onions,
chopped
4 Tbsp soy sauce
1 Tbsp sesame oil
1/2 Tsp black pepper
1 pkg wonton
wrappers



RECIPE

Mix together till well combined. Put a heaping teaspoon onto a wonton wrapper, wet edges of wrapper with water and fold in half, lightly pressing edges together and gently flattening the mixture. When done cover them with a damp towel.

Using a pan that has a lid, add a couple of tablespoons of sesame oil. Heat over medium to medium high heat, add 8 to 10 or more of the dumplings if there is room. Let them sizzle for 2 minutes uncovered without turning them. Add 1/4 to 1/3 cup water to pan and cover. Let steam for 5 minutes. Remove and cover. Repeat until all are done.

Serve with your favorite dipping sauce!
