

#### Ben F. Vaughan III, An Early CCA Volunteer




Ben was a dedicated conservationist and sportsman, committed to preserving Texas' bays and estuaries. He received awards from Texas Parks and Wildlife, the Coastal Conservation Association, the Caesar Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute and the UT College of Natural Science for his efforts.

Ben was the moving force in founding the Ben F. Vaughan Jr. Hatchery and Research Center in Corpus Christi, named for his father. The Center was instrumental in restoring redfish to Texas waters. The center is a facility dedicated to the study and preservation of aquatic life. The center specializes in breeding and researching various species of fish and other water-dwelling creatures.

With a focus on conservation and education, the center contributes valuable knowledge to the field of marine biology. Visitors can observe the research efforts

and learn about the importance of protecting aquatic ecosystems. Ben also lobbied tirelessly for the preservation of river water rights benefiting Texas' bays.


A lifelong outdoorsman, Ben raised and trained many Brittany Spaniels, all descendants of his pride and joy Hector, as Ben said, "The best dog who ever lived." Ben was also known for his South Texas aphorisms: "Smilin' like a possum eatin' green persimmons – happy as a duck eatin' a June bug – a little bit of a lot can be a bunch."

Ben grew up in Corpus Christi and spoke fondly of a youth spent hunting and fishing the Gulf Coast. He received his A.B. degree in 1963 from Stanford University majoring in classics and began his Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania with the intention of




pursuing a teaching career in Greek and Latin. After a family medical crisis, Ben decided to return to his home state to pursue law instead. He obtained his LL.B. degree with honors in 1967 from The University of Texas School of Law,



where he served as an Associate Editor of the Texas Law Review, and graduated Order of the Coif.

Ben clerked at Graves Dougherty Gee & Hearon (as the firm was then called) after his first year, and after a yearlong appointment as law clerk to Justice Robert W. Hamilton of the Texas Supreme



Court, he joined the firm in August 1968 – a partnership that would endure for the next 56 years. He was a daily and beloved presence at Graves Dougherty until the day before his death.

Ben was generous to a fault. He never refused a request for help. He sought out the best in everyone



he met. He was a man of faith and practiced his faith in his work and in his charity. Ben was a dedicated husband and father. Our deepest condolences go out to Ben's wife of 60 years, Daphne; their children, Bear and James; and all



extended family. Ben will be sorely missed by all who knew him.

## Texas Oysters and a Path to a Sustainable Fishery

Texas is one of the few remaining states with a significant public reef oyster fishery. The harvest season spans from November to April, and any of the 546 state-issued licenses can be used to dredge oysters from designated shellfish harvest areas which are managed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and the Texas Department of State Health Services. While annual landings fluctuate, public reef harvest typically accounts for 78% of the total landings reported to TPWD, with the remaining 22% coming from private lease areas.

Each year, before the season begins and throughout its six-month duration, TPWD conducts targeted oyster sampling in harvest areas on historically fished reefs. By assessing the abundance of harvestable oysters, TPWD

determines whether an area is suitable for public reef harvest. In recent years, most harvest areas have been closed to allow the oyster population to recover which has forced oyster boats to concentrate within fewer locations, intensifying the impacts of dredging. A drive along Highway 35 across the Copano/Aransas Bay or Lavaca Bay Causeways provides a clear view of this situation in real-time.

Oysters are invaluable to Texas' coastal ecosystems, providing essential ecological services that benefit marine life and human communities. As a keystone species, oysters (particularly the Eastern Oyster - *Crassostrea virginica*), help form intricate reef systems that support biodiversity, stabilize shorelines, and enhance water quality. However, the oyster fishery faces significant challenges due to environmental changes and commercial

harvest via dredging reefs. To ensure a sustainable future, we must recognize the full ecological value of oysters and implement effective conservation strategies.

#### The Ecological Importance of Oysters

Oyster reefs are much more than a source of seafood; they are a critical component of Texas' coastal ecosystems. These reefs act as natural barriers, slowing water surges and helping to prevent shoreline erosion. They also provide structured habitats for a wide variety of marine species. More than 300 species rely on oyster reefs for shelter, food, and habitat, including commercially and recreationally valuable fish like blue crabs, sheepshead, red drum, and spotted seatrout.

Oysters are natural filter feeders, capable of filtering over 50 gallons of water per day. Through their removal of nutrients, such as phytoplankton and chlorophyll, they help improve water quality and reduce turbidity. This filtration process also aids in sequestering carbon, contributing to coastal resilience in the face of climate

change. Additionally, oysters enhance benthic (bottom-dwelling) ecosystems by creating complex habitats that support higher biomass than other coastal environments, such as seagrass beds or salt marshes.

The economic value of oyster reefs extends far beyond the harvested product, especially when you place a value on the ecological services they provide in the water. Restored reefs can generate significant ecosystem services, including fish production, habitat provision, and shoreline stabilization, with annual ecosystem service values ranging from \$2,000 to \$40,000 per acre, depending on the health of the reef. Additional benefits of oyster reefs for recreational

angling are estimated at \$23,000 per acre. In contrast, the commercial value of oysters harvested from public oyster reefs is estimated at \$800 per acre.

#### **Challenges Facing the Oyster Fishery**

Despite their resilience, oysters face increasing pressure from human activity and environmental changes. Historically, the most significant threat to their survival is the alteration of freshwater inflows to coastal ecosystems. Over the past century, the flow of freshwater from major rivers has been increasingly impounded and diverted for agricultural, industrial, and municipal uses, with some bays now experiencing near-total lack of freshwater inflows. This reduction in freshwater flow negatively impacts estuaries, depriving oysters of the vital conditions they need to thrive.

The accelerating pace of environmental change, driven by both climate change and human intervention/ development, has also taken a toll on the oyster population.

Rising sea temperatures, droughts, hurricanes, and flooding events,

along with an overcapitalized Texas fishery, have led to the destruction of public oyster reefs. In some cases, unscrupulous fishing practices, such as the illegal harvest of undersized oysters and/or harvesting on closed reefs, exacerbate the problem.

As a result, many oyster reefs in Texas have reached a point of ecological degradation that may be beyond restoration. While some reefs may not recover to their former status, there is still hope for protecting and rebuilding oyster reefs and enhancing the oyster fishery through proactive, sustainable conservation and restoration efforts.

#### Solutions for a Sustainable Oyster Fishery

Restoring and preserving Texas' oyster reefs requires a multi-faceted approach that prioritizes ecological values alongside sustainable oyster production and harvesting practices. Key solutions include:

#### 1. Enhancing Conservation Efforts:

License Buyback Programs: Expanding participation in oyster license buyback programs will reduce fishing pressure on overexploited reefs and encourage responsible harvesting. Texas will likely need to reduce the number of licenses in the fishery from 546 licenses to somewhere between 175-200 licenses.

Bay-Bottom Lease Expansion: Expanding the number of state-managed bay-bottom leases provides commercial oystermen with the opportunity to invest in creating their own reefs, maintaining them through thin-layer cultch placements, and harvesting them sustainably. Growing this program will reduce dependence on public reefs, helping to protect sensitive habitats from the impacts of the public fishery. Currently, around 22% of annual landings in Texas come from 43 areas (approximately 2,300 acres) in Galveston Bay that are under location certificates (leases), and efforts are underway to further expand this program.

Non-Harvestable Conservation Leases: Along with the expansion of the commercial oyster lease program, conservation groups and research institutes will be able to lease bay bottom for the specific intent of creating or restoring oyster reefs which will be permanently closed to commercial harvest. Creating conservation leases for nonharvestable oyster areas can safeguard critical spawning grounds and help replenish depleted reefs.

#### 2. Promoting Oyster Mariculture:

Cultivating oysters through mariculture (oyster farming) offers a sustainable alternative to wild harvesting, reducing pressure on natural reefs and providing a controlled environment for oyster production. Growing farmed oysters in the water column creates a cleaner, better-tasting and more desirable product for the half-shell market. In Texas, there are currently 12 farms, 2 nurseries and 2 hatcheries fully permitted, and another 31 farms with conditional permits. #### 3. Establishing Oyster Sanctuaries:

Designating oyster broodstock sanctuaries in bay systems will help protect broodstock, ensuring the continued production of larvae that can repopulate nearby reefs. Sanctuary reefs serve as critical spawning reserves, bolstering oyster populations in the surrounding public waters.

#### 4. Strategic Restoration Plans:

Large-scale restoration efforts should focus on rebuilding oyster reefs that support ecological functions, coastal resiliency and greatest value to local economies. Scientific research can guide the development of these restoration projects, ensuring they are designed to achieve measurable improvements in ecosystem health and

#### Oyster Management – Recent History

While future action is needed for the long-term sustainability of Texas public oyster reefs, it is important to recognize the steps that have been taken thus far. Let's look back at the last few years.

#### <u>2017</u>

Legislative Action - House Bill 51:

- Established the commercial oyster license buyback program.
- Required shellfish certificate holders (oyster dealers) to distribute oyster shell or approved cultch material equal to 30% of the oysters purchased in waters designated by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) or pay TPWD for shell acquisition and deposition at the same rate.
- Increased penalties for undersized oysters, with repeat or severe violations resulting in a Class B misdemeanor and a 30-day license suspension.
- Seafood dealers held accountable for repeat violations related to undersized oysters.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Action:

- Daily sack limit reduced to 30 sacks.
- Commercial oyster harvest closed on Saturdays.
- Tolerance for undersized oysters reduced from 15% to 5%.
- Permanently closed harvest in Christmas Bay, Carancahua Bay, Powderhorn Lake, Hynes Bay, St. Charles Bay, and South Bay.
- Creation of a 300-foot shoreline buffer along the entire coastline, prohibiting harvest from the water's edge.

#### 2019

Legislative Action - House Bill 2321: Enhanced penalties for oystering in closed areas. Legislative Action - House Bill 1300: Creation of the Texas Cultivated Oyster Mariculture Program.

#### 2022

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Action: Permanently closed oyster harvest in Ayres, Mesquite and Carlos Bays.

#### 2023-2024

- Creation of a Governor-appointed Commercial Oyster Mariculture Advisory Board.
- Creation of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Oyster Advisory Committee.




productivity. Strategic restoration plans work hand in hand with lease expansions.

**5. Continued Enforcement and Adaptive Management:** Continued enforcement against illegal harvest and targeted sting operations are necessary to ensure that active participants in the oyster fishery are following existing regulations and that safeguards for resource protection are effective. There are numerous management tools, such as sack limit changes, gear restrictions, and number of fishing days, that are available for fishery managers to consider in the near term to further improve the sustainability of the public reef oyster fishery; after the implementation of a successful buyback program, fishery managers can adapt to a new landscape and consider strategies to spatially or seasonally spread out the remaining fishing pressure.

#### Conclusion

Oysters are indispensable to the ecological health of Texas' coastal ecosystems. Their reefs provide habitat for numerous marine species, stabilize shorelines, and improve water quality, among other essential functions. However, the challenges they face—ranging from habitat loss to fishing pressure—threaten their future. By embracing conservation initiatives such as license buyback, supporting sustainable oyster farming, and investing in restoration



efforts, we can work to ensure that oysters continue to thrive in Texas waters, benefiting both nature and the economy for generations to come.

#### CCA Texas Ends 2024 by Funding Over \$1.24 Million for Conservation Efforts

CA Texas' Executive Board closed out 2024 by funding over \$1.24 million for conservation efforts on the Texas coast. The ability to fund these important conservation efforts is directly attributed to the strength of our local chapters and their volunteer efforts. They stepped up in a BIG way to make a difference up and down the Texas coast. > \$110,215: TPWD Coastal Fisheries Interns - CCA Texas has helped fund the summer internship program for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) Coastal Fisheries division for over 15 years. The Executive Board approved funding for \$110,215 for 2025. This funding will help provide the necessary funds for fourteen interns. These interns work closely with TPWD staff in the coastal fisheries ecosystem offices and hatcheries, gaining valuable experience while also providing TPWD with the opportunity to work with potential future employees. In the beginning, the original funding covered four interns in 2009 and has now grown to fourteen coastal fisheries interns. Many of these summer interns have eventually gone on to work for TPWD in the Coastal Fisheries Division.

> \$15,600: TPWD Game Warden **Interns** - In addition to funding interns for TPWD Coastal Fisheries, CCA Texas has funded TPWD Game Warden Interns for nearly a decade as well. At the November Executive Board meeting, \$15,600 in funding was approved for six Game Warden interns in 2025. Like the Coastal Fisheries interns, this funding enables these interns to work closely with Game Wardens all along the coast while also providing TPWD with the opportunity to work with potential future game wardens. This program provides these interns with invaluable experience to put on their resumes should they apply for the Texas Game Warden Academy down the line.

#### > \$51,004: TPWD Game Warden Equipment in Region IV

Texas Game Wardens are on the front lines protecting our Texas coastal and inland resources and they rely on organizations like CCA, Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation's (TPWF) Gear Up for Game Wardens, and other organizations to help supplement the necessary funding for equipment needed to do their jobs. CCA Texas has a long and proud history of supporting our Texas Game Wardens. This funding includes:

> \$5,070 to convert one Mercury Verado 300 HP motor from a dual motor SafeBoat to a 25' single motor patrol unit for use in Brazoria and Matagorda counties. Budget constraints limit the ability to repower patrol vessels in a timely manner and this conversion will bridge that timing gap.

> \$5,639 for eight Airboat Communication Headsets. Four new airboats were recently acquired and will be used for resource patrols and disaster response efforts. These resource patrols include enforcement in shallow marshes for commercial oystering and shrimping, recreational fisheries enforcement, waterfowl, and environmental issues. These headsets will provide Wardens with a necessary communication system onboard while protecting them from the noise of the airboats.

> \$8,400 for handheld thermal imagers. These thermal imagers are necessary tools for resource protection, water safety, and search and rescue. It is common practice for those who violate resource laws to do so during the cover of night. This equipment enables the wardens to more easily detect illegal practices by bad actors in the commercial fishing industry including flagrant violations such as shrimping, crabbing, and oystering at night. With these thermal imagers, heat signatures of a boat can be detected up to a mile away even on the darkest of nights. These imaging devices are also critical in search and rescue efforts in the middle of the night. They will be used primarily in Jefferson and Orange counties.

> \$30,767 for a Matrice M30T Drone. The Matrice M30T Drone will greatly enhance their ability to patrol the Gulf of Mexico and Texas bays for commercial and recreational fisheries enforcement. With its ability to cover large distances

and capture high-quality aerial footage, the drone will provide a bird's eye view of activities in the patrol area. This will allow them to respond more quickly and effectively to potential illegal activities in a patrolled area. This drone will also be equipped with a thermal camera to use in search and rescue operations as well.

This equipment will be used primarily in the Gulf of Mexico and Bays of Region IV. > \$200,000 (\$50,000 Annually):


Operational Funding for Sink Your Shucks

In 2009, the Harte Research Institute for Gulf of Mexico Studies at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi (HRI) created the Sink Your Shucks Program. This program has reclaimed and recycled over 3 million pounds of oyster shells since its creation, representing more than 45 acres of restored oyster reef in Texas waters. More than 2,000 community volunteers have participated in reef restoration events, and community events and school programs have engaged more than 5,000 citizens annually. CCA Texas' funding will cover the remaining necessary funds not covered by an existing NOAA grant or charitable contributions for the next four years.

> \$40,000: Packery Flats at Kate's Hole Parking Area Living Shoreline

The Coastal Bend Bays and Estuaries

This \$750,000 endowed gift from CCA will be equally matched, by an anonymous donor, to establish a \$1.5 million permanent fund designated toward the Center for Sportfish Science and Conservation.

Program (CBBEP) is currently developing a living shoreline that will protect the public access parking area and create habitat at the Kate's Hole Parking area. These funds will be used with \$60,000 from the CITGO Caring for Our Coast program to enhance and protect this area.

#### > \$75,000: Kid's Fishing Pier at the CCA Marine Development Center

This funding will replace the old Kid Fishing Pier at the CCA Marine Development Center (MDC) in Corpus Christi. This pier is used for community events and outreach activities held at the CCA MDC. This rebuild will take place in 2025.

> \$750,000: Mark W. Ray CCA Texas Endowed Directorship of the Center for Sportfish Science

and Conservation, Harte Research Institute for Gulf of Mexico (HRI) and Texas Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi.

CCA Texas has been a long-time supporter of the Center for Sportfish Science and Conservation (CSSC) at the Harte Research Institute for Gulf of Mexico Studies (HRI) at Texas A&M **University-Corpus** Christi. Previous support from CCA has allowed CSSC to be proactive, positioning the CSSC as the 'go-to' source for those seeking scientific information and advice regarding the management and sustainability of our saltwater recreational fisheries. This

Sportfish Science and Conservation," will be used to directly and solely support sportfish research and conservation.



Each year, we award a total of \$325,000 in scholarships to youth ages 6-17 for claiming their spot on the leaderboard at the end of the tournament, and amounts range from \$2,500 to \$30,000. 
furthering their education without the opportunity this program provides. At the conclusion of

The 2021 freeze remains etched in our memories as a stark reminder of nature's fragility. In the aftermath, countless fish populations were decimated, challenging recreational fisheries and ecosystems alike. But adversity has often been met with resilience. Reflecting on the 1983 and 1989 freezes, they had catastrophic impacts, partly because, at the time, Texas had only one operational hatchery in Corpus Christi. This facility was still in its infancy, and the first hatchery-raised red drum was only released in the spring of 1983.

Fast forward to today, and the story is vastly different. When the 2021 freeze rolled around, Texas was equipped with not one but two of the world's largest warm water/saltwater hatcheries. The second facility, located in Lake Jackson, came online in the mid-1990s, and together, these hatcheries have scaled production year after year. Now, they release an astounding 25 to 30 million fingerlings into Texas waters every year, operating 52 weeks annually to sustain and enhance wild stocks. This remarkable recovery and growth would not be possible without the unwavering dedication and expertise of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and its robust hatchery program. On behalf of everyone at CCA Texas and the countless

anglers who benefit from thriving fisheries, we extend our heartfelt thanks to TPWD for their extraordinary efforts to replenish our coastal resources. Truly, there's a reason why everything is bigger and better in Texas.

The STAR Tournament has always been more than a fishing competition; it's a celebration of conservation, family, and the enduring spirit of Texas anglers...and our 2025 edition promises to be even better! Without giving too much away, we can say this: BIG changes are on the way. 





Reports from Texas Parks & Wildlife Game Wardens

On Sunday, November 24th, around 11 p.m. a Galveston County Warden received a call regarding individuals possibly gigging flounder around Pelican Island. Upon arriving at the location, the Warden hid in the tall grass near the beach to observe the individuals. The Warden observed an individual working a light in the water about 100 yards down the beach and another individual walking the beach towards him. Once the individual got approximately 20 yards from the Warden's location, he observed the individual with a flounder in his right hand. The individual then turned and went into the tall brush near the beach and when he came back out, he did not have the flounder. The individual then continued down the beach towards the Warden continually scanning the area and looking around. Once close enough, the Warden popped out and identified himself. Both individuals at first denied gigging flounder, but once the Warden informed them he had been watching, one of the individuals went and retrieved the bucket of flounder hidden in the brush. The individuals had five large flounder in the bucket. Citations issued for possessing flounder in closed season and cases pending. -Vu Nguyen, Lieutenant Game Warden

On November 16, 2024, a Jefferson County Warden inspected a Gulf Shrimp boat and found the crew to be in possession of (24) flounder during closed season. Citations issued and Cases Pending.

On November 18, 2024, a Jefferson County Warden inspected a Gulf Shrimp boat and found the crew to be in possession of red snapper and a shark. Citations issued and Cases Pending.

Below is a 'retro' photo from February 25, 2020. Region 8 Game Wardens boarded a shrimp boat during a NRDA patrol in the Gulf of Mexico. During the inspection of the vessel, several shrimp sacks filled with southern flounder were discovered concealed beneath stacked sacks of gulf shrimp and other finfish. The wardens counted a total of seventy-one flounder contained within the shrimp sacks. The shrimp boat Captain was allowed to retain a single daily bag limit of five flounder that are legally allowed to be retained under a commercial captain's license. A total of sixty-six southern flounder were seized.

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
# Putting fingerlings back where fish need to be







## **Upper Coast**

Capt. Ralph Frazier Watch for birds working slicks

As I write this, it seems like winter is never gonna get here, but it will. As the bay water cools, shrimp will start leaving the bay systems. Mobs of birds looking for breakfast, lunch and dinner will become more active, so we will be tuning in and watching in order to catch our own supper. Of course, mobs of trout and redfish will be under those birds, as the normal winter patterns start to come around.

Remember that as December 15 passes, flounder season will reopen. If we haven't had too much cold weather, there will still be flounder in Trinity Bay as the water is deeper in that bay system. Fishing over the deep shell reefs can pay off with flatfish. With shrimp tails, slow your retrieve down and kind of let that lure slowly crawl across the bottom.

Watch for birds working slicks that pop up. Mullet will start getting active as the sun comes up, so key on bait pods. You need to concentrate on the deeper water areas and especially the guts and coves in West Bay. Gamefish ease up into the shallow water as it warms up. Shrimp tales and Corkys fished slower than normal can be productive this time of year.

As always, layer up in warm clothes and take care of your crew. Good idea for the resource: take a young person fishing. –Capt. Ralph Frazier 281-337-0321 Ralph2fish@aol.com

## **Middle Coast**

Capt. Tommy Countz Slowwww down your retrieve

Now is the prime time for fishing in the Colorado River. Drift with the current and cast to the bank. A trolling motor is a big plus; with it you can control your drift. Remember, the colder the water, the deeper the fish will be. More good news; trees block a lot of the wind.

My bait of choice is a 1/4 or 8-ounce leadhead rigged with a soft plastic bait that has a lot of wiggle. The Norton Sand Shad Jr. in chartreuse or hot pink fits the bill. Another bait that produces well is a Rattletrap. It can get down deep and has a lot of vibration.

This fall the river started producing good action on trout in early October and has only gotten better. In early December, East Matagorda Bay could still have some bird activity if the temperatures are warm. Drifting scattered shell is another option. Most of the west end of the bay is covered with shell. Using the same baits as in the river and making long drifts can be very productive.

January is pretty much the same pattern as fishing in December. Deeper water will be warmer, so slowwwww down your retrieve and "feel the fish on."

After a big blow comes in and the tides are the lowest, redfish have to come out of the back areas on the south shore. If you find one or two reds, you'll find a bunch.

Look for trout in deeper holes

Hola again from South Texas! It's been a crazy weather year. Seems like Mother Nature has been running a few weeks behind and might finally be catching up to the calendar.

We have been dealing with extremely high water lately and apparently the entire coast has too. Water levels are coming down now and should stay lower as winter arrives.

Trout fishing has been really good and I expect it to stay that way as long as we don't get another devastating cold front. Because of the new TPW regulations we have seen a great number of big trout up on the flats. Look for them to hold in deeper holes as the water temperatures drop. I like a 3" paddle tail lure in a motor oil and chartreuse tail—slowly!

Most of the redfish have been staying in deeper water, which will be the trend throughout the next few months. Just like trout fishing, remember to work the bait slow this time of year.

The LLM is in great shape and is getting better. Lots of different species of fish roaming the flats, including blue crabs which is a great sign!

## Port O'GetdownConnor Shrimp Gumbo

4 Tablespoons flour / 4 Tablespoons bacon fat / 2 Quarts fish or chicken stock 1 lb. fresh deveined shrimp, boiled for 5 minutes / 1 lb. sliced and sauteed andouille sausage / 2 cloves garlic, minced / 1 large onion, chopped / 1 Cup celery, chopped 1 medium green pepper, chopped / 2 bay leaves / 3 sprigs parsley, chopped 2 Tablespoons file / Salt and Pepper to taste

In heavy dutch oven, heat bacon fat, add flour gradually, stirring constantly so it heats evenly. Continue to stir until roux becomes the color of an old penny.

Add vegetables and cook until soft.

Add stock, sausage, bay leaves, salt, pepper and parsley.

Bring to a boil and simmer for an hour.

Add shrimp and simmer for 5 more minutes.

Remove from heat, add file and serve over rice.



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
