A 22-year CCA Tradition Continues 2025 Abandoned Crab Trap Removal Program

Messy, difficult, but worth it. This annual program brings dozens of volunteers to the bays, intent on the opportunity to eliminate damaging wire-mesh traps. When left untended, they are considered "abandoned ghost traps." The traps attract new captives that feed on previous victims. Eliminating the traps also makes Texas bays safer for boaters and waders; a fouled transom or propeller can end a trip on an expensive, time-wasting note. Waders have suffered cuts from encounters with the hidden traps, many of which settle invisibly into the bottom.

The traps can be lost due to storms that move them and break the float lines, or they can simply be abandoned by trappers. At any rate, the fatal-attraction devices must be removed, if not by the owner, by volunteers willing to use muscle and time on the water. The toll is tremendous.

TPWD research has shown that a derelict crab trap can catch and kill as many as 60 blue crabs a year. But

other important bay species get involved in the cycle; more than 40 species of marine life have been included in the progression of death.

"Getting out there and pulling abandoned crab traps is one of those rare instances where you can see you've had an immediate positive impact on the bays," Ronnie Luster said. "The volunteers get a real sense of satisfaction out of that. They know they make a difference."

Luster began his involvement due to resentment the traps can have on the Shoalwater Bay ecosystem. He and wife Lyn realized the proliferation of the traps seemed exponential, from seeing a handful of traps when he began fishing Shoalwater in 1961 to hundreds. "There just got to be more and more of them," Luster said, adding that the traps became so numerous they became a significant hazard to anglers, boaters and even retrievers used by duck hunters. "My wife and I were in my airboat, and we



made a seven-mile run down Shoalwater Bay," he said. "We counted 1,800 crab traps. I knew something had to be done."

Getting an effective program into action was not an easy task. There were roadblocks; under Texas law, even derelict traps that may have been observed for years were still private property. Only trap owners and law enforcement officers could remove them.

Luster discovered that Texas Game Wardens were allowed to collect abandoned crab traps but had to store the traps and post notices in local courthouses. How about giving understaffed, overworked Texas Game Wardens some help from Texas outdoorsmen? He got the Coastal Conservation Association involved. After discussions and meetings, dozens of CCA members showed up to help Texas Game Wardens remove derelict traps from the waters around Port O'Connor on a winter weekend. "We had close to 20 boats involved," Luster recalled. "We picked up 800 traps. A few weeks later, we did it again and picked up another 750. There was not a single legal trap among them."

It took time, but CCA managed to get changes in the

law that allowed private citizens to remove derelict crab traps. In the Texas Legislative session of 2001, a bill by State

Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, provided a solution. The bill authorized Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to set a brief closure of all Texas bays to crab trappers. All traps in the water during the closure were designated as abandoned litter and could be lawfully removed

by citizens.

The first closure and cleanup effort came in February 2002, planned to coincide with the slow season for commercial crabbing as well as when northerly winds often provide tides lower than normal, showing many derelict traps. That first effort, coordinated by TPWD's coastal fisheries division and supported by CCA and other sponsors, was a stunning success. Almost 600 volunteers moved across Texas bays, removing 8,000 "abandoned" traps.

The program has continued each year since, with the main volunteer effort traditionally set on the first Saturday of the 10-day closure. This year's closure of Texas bays to derelict crab traps is set for February 21 through March 2. Derelict traps encountered during the closure can be removed and placed in designated areas around the coast.

The main volunteer effort to remove traps is Saturday, February 22. TPWD designated locations in each major bay system as drop-off sites for collected traps, with many of those sites serving as gathering spots for volunteers.

Besides the CCA, Galveston Bay Foundation, Coastal Bend Bays and Estuaries Program, San Antonio Bay Foundation and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service provide volunteers and support for the effort.

If it wasn't for volunteers, this program wouldn't be the success it has been. Without Ronnie Luster and a handful of other determined coastal anglers, it might never have happened at all. **–Sam Caldwell**

Texas Parks and Wildlife Secures Significant Victory for Oyster Conservation

he Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission (TPWC) adopted proposed amendments to the Statewide Oyster Fishery Proclamation that accomplishes a suite of actions, providing positive change for the oyster fishery, including the establishment of a Certificate of Location (CoL) program for restoration activities, opportunities for expansion of the CoL program for

commercial oyster production, allowance for siting of CoLs on degraded oyster beds, and modernization of administrative processes for the CoL program (read the entire proposal preamble here).

At the TPWC meeting, Chairman Jeffrey Hildebrand emphasized that while existing commercial CoLs cover a mere 2,318 acres, all situated in Galveston Bay, they contribute over 20% of Texas's annual harvest on average. He also followed up with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) staff, directing them to find ways to expand the commercial CoL program with the intent of providing greater relief to public oyster reefs.

CCA Texas <u>supported the proposal</u> and has <u>publicly</u> <u>advocated for the expansion of commercial CoLs and the need for restoration CoLs</u> for several years. Additionally, our <u>article</u> from the last edition of CURRENTS highlights the need for CoL expansion and provides additional recommendations for a path to a sustainable oyster fishery.

"For quite some time, we have requested restoration Certificate of Locations (CoL), and along with State Senator Lois Kolkhorst and State Representative Todd Hunter, fought to help pass the legislation needed to turn this concept into a reality," stated Rocky Chase, Chairman of the CCA Texas Government Affairs Committee. "The more we can facilitate oyster restoration, the better. Having restoration CoLs will enhance opportunities and encourage investment in restoration efforts, greatly benefiting our coastal fisheries and angler opportunities to enjoy our valued resources."

The CoL program can be a bit complex, but it's helpful to think of it as a type of lease from the state. For restoration CoLs, organizations such as non-profits, research institutions, and NGOs can lease degraded areas of up to 100 acres to carry out oyster restoration activities, following active use criteria set by TPWD. During the lease term, these areas will be closed to commercial oyster harvesting. Commercial CoLs, on the other hand, follow similar criteria as restoration CoLs, but they grant the leaseholder exclusive rights to harvest oysters within their leased area.

Within the oyster community, it is well understood that CoLs are meticulously managed to promote sustainable harvesting. This includes the strategic placement of cultch to provide vertical relief on the reef, which supports the recruitment of oyster larvae for future harvests. This deliberate approach stands in stark contrast to the melee that occurs on public oyster reefs. Combined with a robust oyster license buyback program, the expansion of CoLs will reduce the oyster fishery's dependence on public

reefs. "Expansion of CoLs is a necessity for oyster reef conservation, offering a viable offramp for commercial oyster fishermen solely reliant on the public reef oyster fishery," said Shane Bonnot, CCA Texas Advocacy Director. "We are pleased that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission and department staff recognize the importance of this program and the opportunities it will provide to the oyster industry."

The adopted amendments balance ecological restoration, regulatory clarity, and stakeholder engagement, positioning Texas as a leader in sustainable oyster fishery management. Future

investments in CoLs for oyster restoration and commercial interests will leverage the immense benefits oysters provide to water quality, biodiversity, shoreline protection, and carbon sequestration. Furthermore, by addressing both conservation and oyster industry concerns, these regulations will yield significant environmental, economic, and coastal community benefits over time.

Moving forward, continued collaboration with stakeholders is encouraged to ensure the long-term success of future restoration efforts. To that end, CCA Texas has pledged \$5 million specifically for oyster reef restoration and intends on utilizing a significant degree of the funds under the CoLs umbrella when possible.

"Thank you to TPWD staff for their thoughtfulness in the development of these recently passed regulations," stated Bonnot. "I'm sure CCA members will be excited about the chance to restore some of their favorite historic reefs to their former glory by means of the CoL program."





Reports from Texas Parks & Wildlife Game Wardens

On 02/01/25, a Jefferson County Warden cited an individual for over the daily bag limit on black drum by (13) fish and undersized black drum (3). Cases Pending. On 1/27/25, Jefferson County Wardens observed a commercial shrimp boat offloading in Sabine Pass. The Wardens boarded the vessel and conducted an inspection of the hold and documents on board. During the inspection, they located several sacks of nongame fish and found the vessel to be over the daily bag limit of Sheepshead by 29, black drum by 5, for a total of 34 fish over their limit. Cases Pending.

On 1/25/25, Jefferson Co. Wardens were patrolling the Keith Lake Fish Pass near Sabine Pass when they checked two fishermen in possession of a total of 18 fish, which included 2 undersized red drum and 5 undersized black drum. Citations were issued to both subjects for possession of undersized Red Drum, undersized Black Drum, and one warning each for over the daily bag limit of Black Drum. Cases and restitution pending.

On Saturday, February 1st, 2025, game wardens assigned to the Victoria district performed a reef fish compliance patrol along the 9-mile federal line during the federal closure of red snapper. During this patrol, the wardens encountered two recreational sport fishing vessels traveling back from federal into state waters inside the 9-mile boundary. A total of 18 red snapper were discovered onboard the two vessels during inspections. The wardens issued a total of 5 citations and seized the wildlife resources. All resources were donated to those in need.

On 01/16/2025, A Galveston Warden cited (2) individuals for possession of (3) oversized black drum. Cases Pending.


Putting fingerlings back where fish need to be

Hatcheries were an early priority of CCA. Enhancing populations was crucial, but replacing a large percentage of cold-stricken gamefish proved to be a primary benefit of the hatcheries.







Upper Coast

February and March can be a rollercoaster when it comes to air and water temperatures. The recent late January snowstorm combined with our other precipitation may well affect the salinity levels in some locations, requiring adjustments to the typical late winter / early spring patterns. When searching for redfish and trout, targeting areas with mud and shell is a great location to start. Watch for bait. Feeding shore birds and loons can also direct an angler to an area holding fish.

Drifting while using soft plastics on a quarter ounce lead head is a good method to start. My favorite soft bait this time of year includes those having a slight tail vibration. In clear water, I prefer something with a pink body. Otherwise, I typically go with a purple of some sort to start out and adjust as needed. Live shrimp is always a payoff technique, especially if targeting species such as black drum and sheepshead. My favorite rigging is a loud popping cork attached to a 3-foot 20lb test mono leader weighted with a small split shot and #2 kahle hook. I find that in some instances these two species have a "slower bite" as do redfish and trout. More solid hookups can be achieved by pointing the rod tip towards the fading cork. Slowly tighten the line until the weight of the fish is felt, then hang on!

As always, use good judgment and be courteous to your fellow fishermen both at the launch and on the water. Be responsible and take a few minutes to reacquaint yourself with the fishing and boating regulations. Middle Coast

Capt. Josh MacNaughton Baitfish hunted on shorelines

Now hungry speckled trout start transitioning from deeper winter holes to shallower grass flats and sand pockets in Aransas, Copano and Mesquite Bays. Soft plastics like Down South Lures and MirrOlure suspending baits will entice a bite. Black drum, often overlooked in favor of their feisty redfish cousins, provide some of the most reliable action in the spring. Gear up at one of our coastal bend Academy Sports and Outdoors to ensure your equipment is suitable for the target species and conditions. March winds can push baitfish into windblown shorelines, where slot reds hunt for an easy meal. Look for tailing reds in the flats around Mud Island, the Blackjack Peninsula, and South Bay. I recommend using gold spoons and paddle-tail swimbaits to match the natural forage.

Starting in mid-February, warm mornings around Estes Flats or the Lydia Ann Channel can hold surface-feeding trout, making topwater lures like Heddon Super Spooks a choice for aggressive springtime trout. Cut mullet or live croaker fished along the edges of shell reefs and oyster beds can produce big, drag-peeling runs.

Let me take you on a fish-catching kayak adventure! You can quietly ease into shallow marshes where you can stalk reds and trout for miles, undisturbed by boat traffic. Aransas Pathways is an excellent resource to find great launch sites. Texas Parks and Wildlife has paddling trails all along the coast. It's essential to monitor local weather forecasts and plan trips accordingly. Tidal movements also play a crucial role in fishing success; consulting tide charts can help determine the best times to fish.

While fishing responsibly, prioritize safety and respect the laws and rules in place. Adhere to local fishing regulations, including size and bag limits, to promote sustainable fishing practices. By staying informed and prepared, we can look forward to a productive and enjoyable fishing season together, along the South Texas coast this spring. As always, find a way to take a kid fishing and remember to wear your lifejacket!

Absolutely stellar

This time of year is one of my favorites for targeting big speckled trout. Many upper slot and oversized speckled trout during these months are hefty in the midsection area, holding more than average their weight from gorging themselves. I think they have a tendency to eat big but fewer times a day, so when they commit to a bite, it's a big one! Which leads into why we focus on throwing Corky's and bigger baits now. The food source is mainly mullet, so when gamefish commit to a bite, it can be absolutely stellar.

When patterns temporarily change with each cold front that blows through, it's important to keep an open mind, embrace change and learn to go with the flow. "Fish your eyes" is the best way put it. Identify any sign that point to quality fish in an area such as diving pelicans, slicks, bait flipping or structural changes, such as deep to shallow areas, sand-scattered grass beds or a water color change. These are all contributing factors that can help lead you towards a great day on the water.

Remember to give the trophy fish a quick, clean release after collecting a photo for CURRENTS. Stay safe and courteous of other anglers on the water and as always, tight lines! —Capt. Reanna DeLaCruz 361-296-5400

Matagorda Bay Shrimp Chowder

1 lb peeled shrimp / 2 Tbsp butter / ½ small onion chopped / 1 stalk celery chopped / 2 large carrots chopped / 2 medium red potatoes chopped / 1 bay leaf ½ Cup frozen corn / 2 cups fish or chicken stock / 1 Cup milk/ 1 Cup cream 1 tsp Old Bay Seasoning / ½ tsp pepper / Salt to taste

Saute onion and celery on medium heat for 4 minutes. Add carrots and potatoes and saute for 4 more minutes. Add stock and bay leaf and simmer covered for 20 minutes. Add corn, milk, cream and seasonings. Heat on med low for 15 minutes until steaming, but not bubbling. Add shrimp and cook till pink, on same heat about 10 minutes.

Serve with crusty bread.




