Shrimp License Buyback Program: In the CCA entry lobby, you may have noticed a framed example of the 2006 Shrimp License Buyback Program. That successful program provided \$274,000 to retire licenses preventing many old and new shrimp boats from scouring Texas bays.

Oyster License Buyback Program: You'll notice a new framed License Plate commemorating the Oyster License Buyback Program. The \$1 Million, plus aid from concerned Foundations and individuals will prevent 112 Oysterboats from raking public oyster reefs.

Both the Shrimpboat License painting of 2006 and the 2025 Oysterboat painting were done by Sam Caldwell, Texas State Artist 2004.

CA Texas funded the initial \$1 Million for an oyster license buyback program to help reduce the pressure on public oyster reefs.

With this \$1 Million and help from a few Foundations and individuals, 112 out of the 545 existing oyster licenses are being purchased and removed from the fishery. This 20% reduction in licenses will certainly reduce some of the oystering effort on these reefs.

There are plans to conduct a second round of license buyback to hopefully remove even more of these licenses. This first round of buying licenses has been a huge success and a great first step in right-sizing the oyster boat fleet.

CCA Texas Helps Drive Largest-Ever Oyster License Buyback with \$1,000,000 Contribution

arking a major step toward reducing pressure in an overcapitalized oyster fishery, Coastal Conservation Association Texas (CCA Texas) was instrumental in facilitating the most consequential oyster license buyback round in the state's history that will reduce harvest pressure and help restore balance to the resource. From March to May 2025, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) received 115 commercial oyster boat license offers as part of its Oyster License Buyback Program. Ultimately, 112 of the 115 interested offers signed contracts, reducing the total number of oyster licenses in Texas by 20%, an enormous step towards ensuring a more sustainable future for our bays and estuaries. In addition to direct benefits for

the oyster fishery, preventing oyster overharvest will help protect wild public reefs that provide nursery and refuge habitats for other marine life, stabilize shorelines, enhance water quality, and reduce coastal erosion.


This achievement was made possible through strong partnerships and bold investments. Earlier this year, the CCA Texas State Board of Directors approved a \$1 million contribution to serve as anchor funding for this

> latest buyback round. That commitment helped galvanize additional support through the Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation and other private donors.

"We're thrilled with the success of this effort," said Robby Byers, Executive Director of CCA Texas. "It's a testament to the vision of our leadership, and the dedication of our chapters and supporters, whose grassroots fundraising made this possible."

An Overcapitalized Fishery

In 2005, the Texas Legislature enacted a moratorium on the issuance of new commercial oyster-boat licenses to reduce harvesting pressure on public oyster reefs. However, the oyster industry aggressively lobbied for a one-year grace period, which was ultimately included in the legislation,

triggering a rush of new applications and causing the number of licenses to swell from approximately 350 to nearly 760 before the moratorium was fully implemented. Between 2006 and 2016, that number gradually declined to just over 550 licenses due to attrition and non-renewals, where it remained relatively flat.

Oyster license buybacks were first authorized by the Texas Legislature in 2017, but initial efforts faced challenges and limited participation. From 2018 through 2024, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) conducted eight rounds of oyster license buybacks, receiving a total of 78 bids. Many of these bids exceeded the state's ability to complete the transaction, highlighting the need for support from conservation partners to close the gap. In Round 8 alone, TPWD received 9 bids, with an average bid of \$45,611, a mode of \$50,000, and a high of \$100,000. While TPWD has a proven track record of managing effective, long-term buyback programs for shrimp (since 1995), crab (1997), and finfish (1997), the oyster license buyback program proved difficult to gain traction.

That changed in 2025. In a strategic shift from previous reverse-bid auctions, TPWD offered a flat rate of \$30,000 per oyster license. The simplified process with an aggressive offer attracted significant interest, and now 112 of the 545 available oyster licenses are removed from the fishery. Importantly, more than half of those had reported landings in at least three of the last five seasons, meaning the licenses retired will yield meaningful conservation benefits.

"This is conservation through collaboration," said Shane Bonnot, CCA Texas Advocacy Director. "Our \$1 million contribution, alongside state funding and generous private donors, shows what's possible when partners come together to make a positive impact."

A United Front for Conservation

Reducing license pressure on the public reef fishery has long been a priority for conservation groups and responsible members of the oyster industry. Fewer licenses mean less effort concentrated on sensitive reef systems, allowing habitat to recover and reducing conflict over limited resources. The buyback program is funded in part by a surcharge on commercial licenses, ensuring that the fishery itself contributes to long-term sustainability. Additional state funds are achieved through saltwater stamp revenues, which are appropriated by the Texas Legislature.

CCA Texas is deeply grateful to the other philanthropic partners who made this historic round possible, including the Laurie and S. Reed Morian Foundation, the Brown Foundation, the Earl C. Sams Foundation, Jeffery and Mindy Hildebrand, Beaver and Joanie Aplin, John and Mary Eads, and Bobby and Sherri Patton.

Looking ahead, CCA Texas expects additional rounds of oyster license buybacks to follow this successful model. Funding requests from TPWD and support from the Texas Legislature will be essential to securing the necessary state funding to ensure continued success.

We remain firmly committed to advancing strategic initiatives that safeguard Texas' coastal resources, strengthen our fisheries, and preserve healthy, productive ecosystems for future generations. Together, we're proving that conservation works, especially when we work together.

CCA Texas Position Statement on Brackish Groundwater and Saline **Surface Water Desalination**

s coastal communities in Texas increasingly turn to desalination ▲of both brackish groundwater and saline surface water to meet growing freshwater demands, CCA Texas supports responsible, science-based practices that protect the health of our state's coastal ecosystems, fisheries, and water quality.

Our bays are not disposal sites. CCA Texas remains guided by its mission They are nurseries, livelihoods and legacies. Let's keep them that way—for this generation and the next.

Desalination Sources

Desalination is becoming more common across the Texas coast, using technologies like reverse osmosis to remove dissolved ions (salt) and produce freshwater from two primary sources:

• Brackish groundwater, drawn from deep aquifers with moderate salinity levels (typically 1,000-10,000 mg/L TDS), and saline surface water, such as seawater from bays, estuaries, or the Gulf (typically 10,000–35,000 mg/L TDS). For reference, Gulf seawater is ~36,000mg/L.

While desalination offers a valuable source of freshwater for municipal and industrial needs, it also generates a concentrated waste stream, commonly referred to as concentrate, brine, or reject water. Regardless of the terminology, the method and location of discharge are critical considerations. When released into bays and estuaries, this waste stream often presents significant ecological risks. As such and at a minimum, comprehensive permitting and rigorous, site-specific evaluation under the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's (TCEQ) Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) and the federal Clean Water Act are essential to ensure environmental protection.

Environmental Concerns

Surface discharge of desalination effluent, whether from brackish groundwater or seawater, raises serious concerns for the health of coastal ecosystems. While both types of desalination use similar treatment processes, the effluent they produce varies in concentration, chemistry, and volume:

• Seawater desalination produces high-volume brine nearly twice as salty as the original intake water, often exceeding 60,000 mg/L TDS. When discharged into shallow or poorly flushed bays, this hypersaline waste can smother benthic habitats, reduce oxygen levels, and exceed the salinity tolerance of critical species. Brackish groundwater desalination typically produces effluent with lower volume and salinity than seawater desalination; however, it often contains naturally occurring but potentially harmful constituents—such as arsenic, boron, and radionuclides-depending on the geochemistry of the source aquifer. Even at reduced salinity levels, this concentrate can negatively impact sensitive estuarine species and habitats, particularly when discharged into low-energy environments with limited flushing. Moreover, many proposed discharge sites for brackish desalination projects are located in historically freshwater streams and creeks, where ecosystems may be especially vulnerable to changes in water chemistry.

Regardless of source, desalination waste streams can:

• Exceed salinity tolerances for many fish and invertebrates, causing stress, displacement, or mortality.

- · Degrade riparian zones, oyster reefs, seagrass beds, and other vital habitats for aquatic species.
- Alter the natural ecological balance, particularly in semienclosed or nutrient-stressed bays.

While some proponents argue that discharge waste streams could dilute hypersaline conditions in isolated systems, these cases are highly specific and temporary. The long-term risks to water quality, marine life, and ecosystem stability far outweigh any short-term benefits.

CCA Texas Recommendations

to protect sustainable coastal fisheries and preserve the habitats that support them. In line with recommendations from the Harte Research <u>Institute</u> and other coastal experts, we urge the following for all desalination projects in Texas:

• Prohibit surface discharge of brine into rivers, streams, or estuaries—particularly in shallow, semi-enclosed, or poorly flushed bay systems.

These waters cannot absorb concentrated waste without suffering long-term ecological damage.

- Prioritize deep-well injection into geologically isolated underground formations, ensuring zero risk of contamination to freshwater aquifers or groundwater-dependent ecosystems.
- Support offshore discharge only when deep-well injection is not feasible—and only after rigorous modeling demonstrates no significant impact to marine life or water quality.
- Mandate strong environmental review for all proposed discharges, including:
- > Site-specific hydrologic and salinity modeling that accounts for seasonal and climate variability.
- > Baseline and post-discharge biological assessments to monitor impacts on habitats and species.
- > Public transparency and engagement with affected stakeholders, including fishing, conservation, and coastal communities.
- Require comprehensive, peer-reviewed science before any discharge is approved. This includes establishing baseline ecological conditions and benchmark hydrological studies to inform site suitability and cumulative risk.
- Invest in long-term monitoring and adaptive management, guided by independent academic institutions such as Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi's Harte Research Institute and University of Texas Marine Science Institute.

Conclusion

Texas must find new water solutions—but not at the cost of our bays and estuaries. These ecosystems support not only fish and wildlife, but entire coastal economies. According to the 2022 National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated Recreation, Texas's saltwater fishery generates an estimated \$4.2 billion in annual economic impact. That value is rooted in healthy estuarine habitats, clean water, and balanced salinity—all of which are threatened by irresponsible desalination discharge.

CCA Texas believes we can meet our water needs without compromising coastal health, but only if we commit to desalination practices that avoid estuarine discharge and prioritize offshore or deep-well solutions. We will continue advocating for policies that are grounded in science and protective of the people, places, and fisheries that define the Texas

UNDERSTANDING VIBRIO INFECTIONS TO STAY SAFE IN MARINE WATERS

What Is Vibrio?

Vibrio is a group of bacteria naturally found in the bays and coastal waters of Texas. If you've been in saltwater, you've encountered Vibrio. Vibrio encompasses a number of different species, but when most people hear "Vibrio", they think about the rare, but traumatic flesh and limb destruction that it can cause, informally referring to it as "flesh eating bacteria."



How can you be exposed?

Infection occurs when Vibrio enters the body through open wounds, even minor cuts or insect bites. Common activities like swimming, fishing, or handling raw seafood can lead to exposure. Risk of infection is most pronounced when water temperature is at or above about 70°F, although infection can occur year-round. A recent study by researchers at the Harte Research Institute for Gulf of Mexico Studies also found that Vibrio populations temporarily increase sharply during Saharan Dust deposition events.

Symptoms of a Vibrio infection

Symptoms of a Vibrio infection can develop rapidly, including pain, swelling, redness, and fever. In severe cases, loss of limbs or death can occur within 24-48 hours if left untreated.



What to do if you are infected?

If you suspect a Vibrio infection (pain, swelling, fever), seek immediate medical attention. Inform healthcare providers about recent saltwater exposure and potential Vibrio infection.





Avoid Saltwater with Open Wounds: Refrain from swimming or wading if you have cuts or abrasions.




Use Protective Gear: Wear puncture-resistant gloves when handling seafood and closed-toed shoes in water.



Wound Care: Immediately treat any wound that has been exposed to saltwater by flushing and cleaning with warm water and antibacterial cleanser; Chlorhexidine -based products such as Hibiclens® can be purchased at your local pharmacy and provide lasting antibacterial effect. Apply a topical antibacterial ointment and cover the wound with a clean dressing or Band -Aid. Fishermen, bathers, and others should carry, or have immediate access to, small bottles of Hibiclens and antibiotic ointment.







The HEAT is on, and the stories are epic!

but four changes in the lineup occurred just last week. And the

leading fish are beatable—it ain't over till it's over—so the current leaders have another reason to sweat. A long time until Labor Day will finally end the suspense.

ALERT! SOMEBODY needs to go catch some RED tags (and be in it!). So far, only about 20% of the 120 tagged redfish released have been caught. Of that number, 60 were red tags and 60 were blue. Yet five Blue Tag prizes have been claimed versus only two of the Red Tags (Truck/Boat combos!).

PLEASE CLAIM the remaining prizes....at this moment, 98 tagged fish are swimming merrily along. They are there, near WHEREVER you fish, and we want all prizes claimed. Below are just a couple of stories so far. Please make yours the next ones we print. GOOD LUCK!

1st Red Tag: Gary Miertschin

On June 3, I fished with Capt. Ralph Frazier, a well-known and highly respected guide for the Galveston Bay complex, and a good friend for over 35 years. At a spot he



liked, I baited up. Within 30 seconds, the cork went down, I set the hook, and it was clear I had either a nice trout or a redfish. Once I got the fish to the boat, Ralph netted it and said, "This guy has a tag. But it's mossy and may be from last year." I wiped off the gunk and was able to read RE1803 CCA 2025.

We were both in a state of disbelief. Ralph measured it at 21+", clipped off the tag and released the fish. It was a little before 6:45 AM. Ralph made a few calls

and found out that we could take the tag to Bay Harbor Marina in Kemah. I've fished with Ralph since the late 80s. He's a good friend as well as a fantastic fishing guide; he did a great job of identifying what needed to be done and then executing everything perfectly to ensure the catch was valid. It was quite a morning.

2nd Red Tag: Nate Opela

That morning, my friend Brent and I launched out of Indianola Fishing Marina without any idea that I'd end up catching a red-tagged redfish. We managed to catch our limit of trout fairly quickly. I told Brent, "Let's go try somewhere else, take it easy, and throw some bait along

the grass line for redfish."
While I was scanning
the marsh, I saw a big
redfish tailing in the back.
Suddenly, both of our
rods bent over at the
same time. Mine felt like a
smaller fish, so I reeled it
in slowly.

When I pulled it up, I saw it had a red tag. I grabbed the net and saw

that the tag was covered in grass and mud so I thought it might be an old one. I was shaking from excitement, so Brent cleaned the tag and read it out loud—it was from this year, 2025. That's when it hit me. We packed up and rushed back to the marina to turn it in. On our way in, a guy stopped us after seeing the tag in my hand. He told us he had caught a red-tagged redfish about two weeks earlier, just about 100 yards from where I got mine. He said he released it because he wasn't signed up for the tournament. Then he showed us a picture, and it turned out to be the same redfish I had caught.

1st Blue Tag: Steve Isaacs

Sunday morning, at 3:45 AM, I'm up and getting ready. As I pull out, Kathy says, "I love you, be careful, catch a tagged redfish."

Late that day, I told Joe, "We are gonna need bigger hooks. I don't know how we are getting a hook set; the head of the mullet is bigger than my hook!" I cast mullet out, and immediately, something hit it. I set the hook and felt that it was something smaller. I pulled it in, thinking it was a rat red, and I just wanted to get it off and put out another bait, but when it surfaced, I said, "It is borderline." As it went into the net, both

of us said at the same time, "That looks like a tag!" We

looked at each other in disbelief. I saw something blue next to the skin and what appeared to be algae trailing down the side of the fish. I found what appeared to be an old tag in a relatively small redfish. Joe and I were both shaking with excitement, but one thought rose from the fog: 'It has to be videoed.' I pulled the tag free, set it aside, and tried to release the fish gently. I didn't let the fish fight much, so it was still fresh. However, I was a nervous wreck, and the fish was gone as soon as I hit the release on the gripper. I then turned all my attention to the 'old' tag. Using my thumbnail, I scrape the gunk on it to see what it is, and I see 'CCA 2025.'

Medical issues prevented me from fishing for two years. I'm happy to say that about a year ago, I was healed, and this is the first year I've been able to participate in the STAR tournament. Like all who enter this tournament, catching a tagged redfish is a dream that comes true for very few. I never thought it would happen to me, and I am truly thankful.

2nd Blue Tag: Mitchell Mays

I planned a day trip from San Antonio to fish on

Wednesday, June 11. Since we were late getting out, I knew a spot on Spaulding that I had marked where I'm used to catching black drum. When we hit the spot, three anglers stayed in the boat to fish. My buddy and I jumped out to wade. I stuck with one of my go-to soft plastics -Down South Watermelon Red. I was focused on the shoreline but had to cross a 6-foot canal to get there. I made the swim and began to hammer the bank. I laid the lure right on the shoreline. Two cranks and

a pop, and he was on. It was my first fish of the day, and I thought it was a keeper at the initial hook set. After landing the red, I knew he was close to 20. While measuring, I saw a stick-looking thing covered in algae. Realizing what I had was a blue CCA tag, I went into panic mode. Got my snap, put the red on the stringer, and then started yelling at my buddies to come pick me up. I started walking back until they could hear me yelling, "I caught a tagged red fish!"

It was an incredible experience to catch a tagged fish after trying for years! Thank you, CCA, for an amazing group of people and all y'all do to support our fisheries on the coast!

3rd Blue Tag: Robbi Pratt

I only started wade fishing last October. My boyfriend introduced me to fishing and from the first time I stepped into the water, something clicked. There's a rhythm to the

ocean, a calm that settles over me when I'm waist-deep and casting into the unknown. The water became more than a place to fish; it became a space to breathe.

For my birthday this year, we joined CCA and signed up for the

STAR Tournament. We decided to celebrate by

doing what had quickly become our favorite thing - fishing. I was itching to get back in the water. As we waded, I caught a small red, then caught another redfish. As I cradled it in the net, getting ready to unhook and release it, my boyfriend pointed: "It looks like something's growing out of it." What I thought was seaweed turned out to be algae covering a long, plastic object. As I rubbed it clean, the color beneath started to appear - blue. My boyfriend leaned in: "Baby... I think that's it. Does it have any information on it?" And then I saw it: CCA.

I screamed. As I was pulling my phone for a video, the fish thrashed. In the frenzy, the phone slipped from my hands and dropped straight into the water—total panic. I grabbed the clippers from the lanyard around my neck, clipped the tag, released the fish, and somehow managed to net my phone off the seafloor. The phone was toast, but I had the tag! We headed to the Surfside Marina weigh station, called the number on the tag, and confirmed what I could barely believe: I had caught the third blue-tagged redfish of the tournament. I had just won a boat.

The news spread fast, especially among the men I know who've been fishing for years. They were stunned. Some just shook their heads and laughed, saying, "She thinks this is what fishing is...you go one week and catch a 28" redfish, you go the next and win a boat!" Over the past year, the ocean has given me unforgettable days, an appreciation for every fish I meet, and now - a boat. And I'm just getting started.



SCHOLARSHIPS

Each year, STAR awards \$325,000 in scholarships to those young anglers who will be the future of our precious resource. Nothing is more fun than watching the little ones with their first redfish on the line; then it's over, and on to the next kid! Mom and Dad, what better way to get you more time on the water than by bringing the kids along? For \$10 bucks each, they are in a drawing for a \$25,000 scholarship, whether they catch something or not. All the studies show that time spent on the water with family and friends is the #1 reason people fish. In today's times, we need that special bonding that families provide. Good for the soul!

Even better, the Tournament Committee "decided to spread the wealth" across ALL five places in both the STAR kid (10 and under) and the STAR teen Divisions (11-17) so that the action could get more intense! And rewarding, but make sure you read Rule #9 before you get on the water. First place in each will now get a scholarship of \$30,000, then \$20,000, \$15,000, \$7500, \$2500. No longer are these

valid for just "college and universities" but also "accredited technical and trade schools, and vocational training programs."



Add to that the scholarship contracts for the winning kids will be paid directly to the chosen schools, so NO taxes to pay, Mom and Dad. Win, win, and win some more.



Reports from Texas Parks & Wildlife Game Wardens

On June 1st, Texas Game Wardens Elizabeth Guevara & Korina Ramirez were patrolling the Gulf of America for the opening of the federal red snapper season. During the compliance patrol the wardens encountered a vessel retuning to port with a blue marlin aboard. Upon further inspection, it was determined that the vessel did not have a currently issued federal Highly Migratory Species (HMS) permit from NOAA. The wardens completed their investigation and have referred the case to NOAA Special Agents for further prosecution.

On 8/3/25, Brazoria County Wardens inspected a vessel coming in from offshore. Upon inspection, five individuals were cited for over the daily bag limit of red snapper, no valid fishing license, and no Federal HMS permit. Cases Pending.

On August 2nd and 3rd, Game Wardens in Matagorda and Brazoria counties focused on recreational fishing enforcement at Gulf access points. Citations were issued for No HMS Permit, Overlimit of Red Snapper, Overlimit of Lane Snapper, Overlimit of King Mackerel, Possession of Headed and Tailed Fish, undersized Black Drum, and undersized King Mackerel. Cases Pending.

On 8/4/2025, a Jefferson County Warden inspected two groups. One group was found to be in possession of Undersized Red Drum. The other group was found to be Exceeding the Daily Bag Limit on Red Snapper. Citations issued, cases pending.



Founded in 2009 by Miller and Kathie Bassler, the Port Mansfield Cut and Beach Clean Up event was held in Port Mansfield on June 14, 2025. With over 350 volunteers supported by an armada of 65+ boats of all sizes and Captained by experienced fishermen and professional guides, all volunteers were out of the Harbor by 8:15 am headed to the Cut and Beach.

Christi Romero, with The Sportsman's Boats out of Harlingen, once again rounded up over 20 Captains and boats. Her numbers continue to amaze all of us as she has a real knack for getting these volunteers to commit and most all are repeat volunteers, all from the Rio Grande Valley and beyond.

crew, to help unload the boats.

Our 4WD Beach Crew led by Brian McKinsey, arrived at the jetties at 9 am, having made the long haul down PINS in the darkness of the early morning. Big trucks and trailers and coolers of water and tents were set up by Brian's crew and waiting for all the volunteers once they hit the beach. Brian's crew of 5 trucks and all his valuable volunteers assisted workers up and down the beach, before calling it a day at 1:30 PM, and they then left with more trash and debris and headed to Malaquite/PINS headquarters near Corpus Christi to drop off final loads of trash.

Our trash tonnage was less this year and we can attribute that to a number of things. Most importantly, we think the educational benefits of teaching our children and their parents in some cases, how detrimental plastic is to our fishery, is a key to reduced plastic for this year's events and we hope this trend continues.

Go deep, where it's cooler It's hot, but fishing will be hot as well, with

It's hot, but fishing will be hot as well, with most of the fish being in deeper water. Watch for slicks, but there won't be many birds this time of year because most of the fish are from 7 to 15 feet deep—except when they're spawning. They'll be laying eggs in depressions and in the guts.

As a professional guide, I carry live bait for customers, but I'll point out that the quality of the catch goes up when using artificial lures. Shrimp tales and top waters are two of my favorites. Remember to tie on your favorite topwater—there's a special rush when a big trout smashes your topwater. Wade fisherman this time of year are catching a lot of trout with live bait in less than two feet of water. Mullet and other baitfish are always a good idea to key on. Just takes a lot of hard work.

The great thing about September is October coming up! That's when fishing really blows wide open. As always, look after your crew, mind the limits, help anyone who might need it. Remember the limits and take a kid fishing—in a safety vest. Tight lines.—Capt. Ralph Frazier 281-337-0321 / fraziersguideservice.com

Surf flat and green? Get there!

Head out early, come in early, and drink lots of water and Gatorade! We have a number of options for fishing in Matagorda in August. First of all, if the surf is flat and green, get there! August is the time of the year when the winds as normally light. I like to start off in the surf throwing topwaters. Key on bait activity. Often you can find bait up close to the beach with trout feeding on them. If topwaters aren't working, switch to plastics rigged on a 1/4 ounce leadhead. I like electric blue or Black Magic Norton Sandshad.

August is also a good time to wade fish the south shore of West Matagorda Bay. I like guts running through grass beds or sandbars. When doing this, I'll go to 1/16 or 1/8 oz lead heads with dark Norton Sandshad or Sandeel JR's.

September is another story. It's the best time of the year to find pods of redfish schooling along the grassy shorelines feeding on shrimp that are hiding in the grass.

August and September in Matagorda afford an angler a number of great opportunities for some quality fishing. Take care of your crew—it's your first job. —Capt. Tommy Countz 281-450-4037

Topwater slow through potholes

It's been hot—temps and fishing, that is. Get on the water, wipe the sweat from your face and sunscreen up. It's a great time of the year to be catching some fish. Summertime low tides have condensed the fish in certain areas. Reds and trout have been up on shallow flats early in the day and heading for deeper water once the temperatures start to rise.

We have had luck on 3/4" plastic lures in clear bodies with chartreuse tails. Topwater lures have been working well in deeper water once the fish move off the flats.

Poling the flats early in the morning has been productive. Look for groups of tailing reds with trout around them up close to the shorelines. These fish are hungry so any light lure or fly will work well. Work a top water slow through potholes in about three feet of water. Use a drift sock if you're fishing from a boat so you don't move over them too fast. Fly fishermen seem to have an advantage on goodweather days. Work the flat slow by poling a skiff or wading. A good soft presentation with a crab fly should get a bite! Remember to keep a close eye on the weather and pack accordingly. Until next time—Capt. Bayou Creamy Shrimp and Cheese Tortellini

Ingredients:

1 lb. cheese tortellini / 1 lb. large Shrimp, peeled and deveined / 2 Tbsp olive oil / 2 Tbsp butter
4 cloves garlic, minced / 1/2 Cup chopped yellow onion / 1 rib celery, chopped
1 10 oz pkg frozen chopped spinach, thawed and thoroughly drained / 1 Tsp salt / 1/4 Tsp pepper
1 Tsp Italian seasoning / 1/2 Tsp red pepper flakes / 1 1/2 Cups chicken broth / 1 Cup heavy crean
1/2 Cup grated parmesan cheese / 1/4 Cup chopped fresh basil / Juice of 1/2 lemon

In a large dutch oven, heat olive oil and butter over medium heat. Add onion and celery and cook for 3 minutes till onions are transparent. Add spinach and garlic and cook for another 3 minutes. Add seasonings: salt, pepper, Italian seasoning and red pepper flakes, stir until well combined. Add shrimp to the pot and cook for 3 minutes per side until pink. Remove the shrimp and set aside.

Pour in the chicken broth and bring to a simmer. Add the tortellini and cook per the package instructions. Stir in the cream, parmesan cheese, lemon juice, stirring well. Add the cooked shrimp and basil.

Simmer on low for 5 more minutes.




